New Mexico Rancher Joined by Relatives In Fending Off Army

Oro Grande, N.M. — Old John Prather today was joined at his ranch by 25 immediate relatives who have vowed to help state of his eviction from the McGregor Missile Firing Range.

The unarmed band of relatives, plus a shifting group of friends and fellow ranchers, camped out Wednesday night by the Prather house. By their presence, they hoped to discourage any further efforts by U. S. deputy marshals to carry out a court order calling for Prather's eviction.

Fight in Washington

But the most telling development in the long fight by the 82-year-old rancher to avoid selling his ranch for \$209,000 to the government was taking place in Washington.

Three members of New Mexico's congressional delegation met with Pentagon officials. Reps. Joseph M. Montoya and John J. Dempsey, and Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, all Democrats, reported after the talks that nothing definite was worked out.

Hope for Understanding

They said, however, that they hoped an understanding could be achieved resolving the controversy "to everyone's satisfaction."

Prather has threatened to shoot anyone who tries to carry out the eviction order. He kept his 30-30 rifle and .38 caliber pistol close at hand.

The wrinkled rancher pointed out to newsmen a spot near his house where he wants to be buried "if I am shot fighting off the Army."

"I'm going to die on this land one way or another," Prather said.

Lodge, Cabins Burn In Blue Mountains

Pendleton — Fire this morning destroyed the main lodge and five out of about 30 cabins at the Lehman Hot Springs, in the Blue Mountains about 10 miles from Ukiah.

Damage to the main lodge was estimated at \$15,000. It housed a kitchen, recreation center, dormitory, dressing rooms, coffee shop, snack bar and about 35 rooms.

The fire was reported by a Umatilla National Forest ranger who saw a large puff of smoke and flames shooting out of the lodge. He radioed Pendleton for forestry headquarters and fire-fighting equipment was dispatched. The firemen kept the blaze from spreading into timber around the area.

Wayne Grier Named To Advisory Board

Salem — Wynne P. Grier, president of the General Credit Service of Medford, has been named to the Oregon Collection Agencies Advisory Board by Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Grier is first vice president and president-elect of the American Collectors association, Inc., and succeeds Orin Amundson, Portland, to the five-member board.

Gov. Holmes also reappointed Portland attorney Ray L. McGrew to another two-year term. He is Oregon director for the national association.

Signatures Obtained To Block School Bill

Portland — Elmer McClure, master of the Oregon Grange, said today an estimated 7,000 signatures have been certified on petitions seeking to block the newly enacted school reorganization bill.

McClure said that the Grangers are optimistic about obtaining the necessary 24,017 certified signatures needed to block the bill.

The bill, called "one of the worst in Oregon's school history," by Grange leaders, provides for reorganization of school and covers the formation of new districts, the alteration of districts and dissolution of others.
