Snead Slams Out 65 For First Round Lead

Chicago—Samuel Jackson Snead, who in 23 years has parlayed golf stick and a ball into some \$300,000, today had his eye on \$50,000 more, the jackpot of Tam O'Shanter's gold-lined World Open.

Snead, 45, balding and on the pro circuit since 1934, showed the youngsters how to do it Thursday when he blistered through the World's first round with a 7-under par 65.

Snead, who is usually his own worst enemy on the greens, needed only 32 putts to get around sprawling team. He sank a 12-footer for a birdie three on the first and a 13-footer for a birdie four on the second.

Equals Front Nine
Right behind Snead going into today's second round in the four-day, 72-hole, \$101,200 tourney, was Jerry Barber of Los Angeles. Barber equalled Snead's 32 for the front nine, but lapsed a bit coming in and settled for a 66.

Top spot among the women pros was held by Marilyn Smith of Wichita, Kan., who marked her first day as new president of the LPGA by turning in a 5-under-ladies-par 71.

Chicago—Bob Duben of Portland, Ore., shot 75 Thursday in the first round of the Tam O'Shanter world golf tournament, 10 strokes off the pace set by Sam Snead.

Fight Fans See Bobo Out in Six

Portland—Talk among the Portland sporting gentry had it today that Carl Bobo Olson won't see the seventh round in his bout Saturday night with Irish Pat McMurry, but the ex-middweight champ merely shrugged it off.

Olson, who is on a comeback trail after a year's absence from ring wars, figures the fight to be a tough one. However when told observers were predicting a knockout by McMurry within six rounds the soft spoken Olson replied "We'll see, we'll see."

Weigh In at 184
Olson expects to weigh in for the fight at about 184 pounds, three pounds lighter than when he fought Joey Maxim here two months ago.

McMurry, the heavyweight slugger from Tacoma, Wash., will bring a record of 26 wins in 28 pro starts into the ring Saturday. His only loss was to Willie Pastrano.

Portland is McMurry's fight haven. In this city he has fought five times and won each by a knockout, never traveling more than seven rounds to get the job done.

In Better Shape
Sid Flaherty, Olson's manager, and his trainer, Henry Perry, said they thought Bobo was in better shape for this fight than when he fought Maxim.

"Remember," Perry said, "it was a year between fights then, now it's only a couple of months."

Both fighters expect to have a large contingent of rooters here for the fight. Promoter Tommy Moyer said he had sold over 1000 tickets to Tacoma boosters of McMurry's and he said that two plane loads of Olson fans from San Francisco, Olson's old home base, are coming up for the fight.

SF Offer Satisfactory

New York—Satisfied with a "very firm and fair offer" from San Francisco, President Horace Stoneham of the New York Giants is expected to announce within a few days that his club will play there next year.

Stoneham received the formal offer from San Francisco Thursday and, after a day-long conference with club Vice President Chub Feeney, characterized it as a "very firm and fair offer."

The only detail remaining now before Stoneham can announce the franchise transfer is approval from the Giants Board of Directors but no opposition is likely from that quarter.

San Francisco is understood to have offered to build the Giants a 45,000-person capacity stadium with an annual rental of 7 per cent of the gross attendance. Additionally, the city offered that the concessions be operated and exploited by the Giants and that the parking facilities be operated by the city.

Patterson Entrains For Seattle Tonight

Greenwood Lake, N.Y.—Floyd Patterson broke camp here today and started the long journey to Seattle for his second defense of the heavyweight crown.

He is slated to defend against Olympic Champion Pete Rademacher, an amateur, at Sick's Stadium, Seattle, on Aug. 22 for a guarantee of \$250,000.

After a morning job on the road and a forenoon sparring session, 22-year-old Floyd and his entourage motored into New York, where they are scheduled to entrain tonight on the Twentieth Century Limited. They expect to arrive in Seattle Monday.

Training Continues
"I'll do some exercises in the baggage car on the train to keep sharp," Patterson said. "I might even try some shadow-boxing, if I don't lose my balance. I want to be real sharp for this one."

Trainer Dan Florio, accompanying him, said Floyd should be in peak condition. Only 12 days ago he defended against Hurricane Jackson and stopped him in the 10th round. The champion rested but three days after that lopsided encounter and then resumed training here at the Long Pond Inn.

"I want to be very fast for Rademacher," said Floyd before his workout with sparring partners Bob Woodall and Wilson Hannibal, who are accompanying him to Seattle. "He's a big fellow with a knockout punch. Anything can happen if a 210-pound puncher nails you just right."

Floyd Much Lighter
The champion will weigh about 185.

Although Rademacher is an amateur, Patterson emphasized that he is not underestimating him.

"To me he's just like any other fighter trying to take my title away," he continued. "And I'll treat him that way. I'll try to knock him out as soon as I can without taking any unnecessary risks. But I won't go in there and try to slug it out with him while he's fresh and unhurt. That might be playing right into his hands. I'll be very patient and cautious with him until I get him hurt."

The youngest of all heavyweight champions said he was particularly interested in how the fight will draw at the gate — although the gate will not affect his \$250,000 guarantee from the Rademacher backers.

Admires Hurley
"I admire promoter Jack Hurley, and I hope he does well at the gate," he explained. "He's putting on this fight in spite of criticism from all sides because he believes he's right. You've got to admire a man like that."

Others in the west-bound Patterson party are manager Gus D'Amato, Assistant Trainer Buster Watson, Attorney Edwin Schweig and Publicity Man Sam Taub.

"My wife, Sandra, and my

mother, Annabelle, will fly out to Seattle the day before the fight," Floyd said.

His training quarters at Seattle will be picked by Promoter Hurley, the champ added. "I don't know exactly where that will be."

Time Short For Eugene

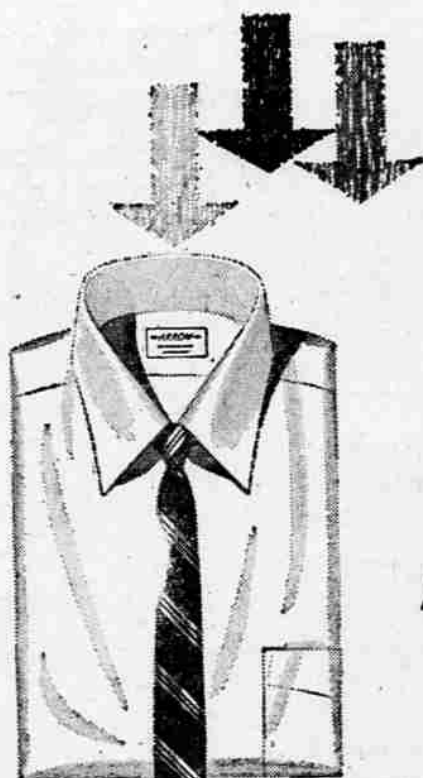
