Grant County Road Employees Quit Jobs

John Day, Ore.—Grant county road employees walked off the job today and said they would "hold union meetings" until members of the Grant county court agreed to arbitrate their demands for a 44-hour week with the same take-home pay they now get for 55 hours. Leo Butts, business representative for the Oregon Public Employees Council, said the men made their request last spring, and received an answer from the county court only Thursday. He said the court's answer was to cut off five overtime hours, meaning the loss to each man of 7 1/2 hours a week. He said this would amount to a reduction in pay for construction equipment operators of about \$750 a year.

The minimum wage here is \$1.43 an hour for road construction. The average pay for equipment operators is \$1.72 an hour.
