Appointment to School Confirmed

David Espey, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Espey, 619 Park st., has received confirmation of his appointment to the U. S. Merchant Marine academy at Kings Point, N. Y.

Espey was nominated in May by Sen. Richard Neuberger.

The youth was graduated in May from St. Mary's school here. He played football and ran track for the school, and was a member of the winning 380-yard relay team at the state "B" track tournament this year.

David will leave Medford Saturday, Aug. 17, by plane. He reports to classes at the academy the following Monday.

His appointment was confirmed by Read Admiral Gordon McLintock, head of the school. One of five federal service academies in the United States, the Kings Point school graduates students after four years with a BS degree.

Graduates are licensed deck or engineering officers in the merchant marine and ensigns in the Navy reserve. The academy is a four year accredited college.

David will enter as a "plebe" or fourth classman among a class of about 250. His second year, as a third classman, will be spent entirely at sea aboard a merchant marine ship.

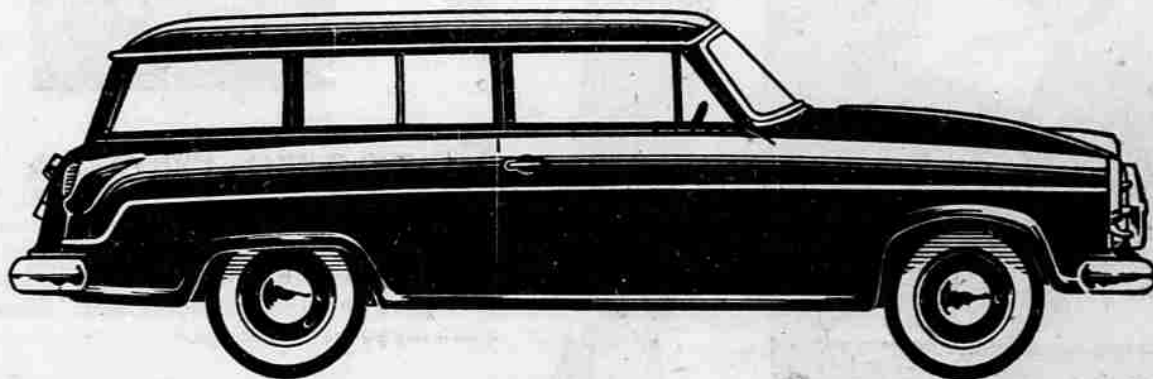
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
