

Giants Vanquish Collegians On Strength of 'Know How'

Chicago—An "old man's know-how" pulled the New York Giants to a 22-12 win over the 1957 College All-Stars in the 24th battle between the best of the pros and the stoutest collegians.

Chuckling Charlie Conerly, a 33-year-old Mississippian with nine years of experience with the National Football League champions, wasted no motions in spurring his team from behind to win.

His chief assistants were Ben Agajanian, 38, a place-kicking specialist, and Ken MacAfee, 28, an end. MacAfee, who has averaged one touchdown for every four passes caught in pro competition, hauled in only three of Conerly's efforts Friday night, but two of them went for touchdowns on gains of 38 and 10 yards.

When Conerly's passing attack slipped, Agajanian produced. In addition to making the conversions after each touchdown, he booted field goals of 33 and 45 yards, the latter only one yard short of the All-Star Game record.

In all, Conerly hit on eight of 17 passes for 124 yards, most of the Giants passing gains of 160 yards.

The All Stars stubborn defense was the biggest surprise to New York Giants Coach Jim Howell.

"They were strong in the line and had us choking up early in the game," Howell said. "The two toughest boys were Guard Jim Parker of Ohio State and Center John Matsko of Michigan State."

Howell said he was "satisfied" with the performance of the Giants, but that they would have to improve a lot in the next six weeks if they're going to successfully defend their National Football League crown.

Ben Agajanian's trusty toe assured victory when his last field goal made the score 20-12 with nine minutes left to play.

Agajanian's 45-yard boot was one yard short of the record set by Lee Artoe of the Chicago Bears in 1941.

Howell singled out John Brodie of Stanford and Paul Hor-

ning of Notre Dame as the best offensive weapons of the Stars. Howell said Halfback Jim Brown of Syracuse was a surprise. "We didn't know he could run that fast," he exclaimed.

The Giants' "Old Reliable" quarterback, Chuck Conerly, said the All Stars almost pulled the game out of the fire in the last quarter when one of his passes was almost intercepted when the Giants were leading by five points.

Howell said his boys were "up" for the game, but not as high as last winter when they trounced the Chicago Bears, 47-7 for the pro championship.

This attacking group, though, had to share honors with the defense. In the second half the All-

Stars gained only seven yards rushing and 62 passing and but for Paige Cothrons 24-yard field goal, they would have been held scoreless.

Cothrons, from Mississippi also, kicked a 12-yard field goal earlier, while another southerner, Billy Ray Barnes of Wake Forest, ran two yards for the All-Star touchdown.

Barnes was the running threat of the collegians, picking up 60 yards in 11 carries with one rush of 29 yards, to lead all ball carriers in average gains.

It was the 17th win for the pro team in the annual game which opens the pro exhibition season. The collegians have won seven with two ties.

Pettit Hits Homer To Give Stars Win Over Angels 6-5

Los Angeles, Aug. 10.—Paul Pettit led off the 10th frame with a homer to give Hollywood its winning run Saturday as the Stars edged Los Angeles, 6 to 5, in a Pacific Coast league contest.

Both squads used three hurlers in the game which Los Angeles tied in the seventh inning. Los Angeles leads the cross-town rivalry 12-7 for the season, although the Angels have now suffered a dozen defeats in their last 14 games.

Pettit's tie-breaking homer was his 15th of the year.

The Stars got two runs in the third when Dick Smith got his first roundtrip this season and Leo Rodriguez singled in one. After Los Angeles evened it in the fourth, the Stars moved ahead again as Jim Baumer connected for his 11th homer following Smith's double in the fifth, and Tony Bartolome singled home an unearned tally in the sixth.

Angels Tie It.

Big Steve Bilko drove in Los Angeles' two fourth-frame runs with a single. Gale Wade's pinchhit single scored another in the sixth and an error and Bilko's sacrifice fly enabled the Angels to tie it in the seventh.

Bob Garber, last of three on the mound for Hollywood, scored his eighth win against six losses, and Babe Birrer lost for 3-6.

In the three-inning old timers' contest, Hollywood took it, 3-1.

Today, Hollywood sends Don Rowe (5-5) and Fred Waters (3-4) against Vito Valentineti (7-4) and Connie Grob (0-1).

A single by Bob Lennon climaxed a two-run, ninth-inning rally and drove in the winning run Saturday as the San Diego Padres edged the Seattle Rainiers 7-6 in a Pacific Coast league series opener at Lane Field.

Pete Messa, the last of three Padre pitchers, got credit for the win, his eighth this year against seven defeats. Bill Kennedy, the last of four Rainier pitchers collected the loss, his first of the season against eight wins.

Rainiers Trail.

The Rainiers trailed during the first seven innings, collecting single runs in the second, sixth and seventh frames while the Padres scored two in the first and three in the third. The seventh inning tally by the Rainiers was on a homer by Bob Thurman, his seventh on the year. The big Padre blows included a one-run triple by Rudy

Regalado in the first and a three-run double by Earl Averill in the third.

The Rainiers came up with a big three-run eighth inning that put them out in front 6-5. The runs came on two walks, a double by Maurice Wills and a two-run single by Dick Aylward.

Lennon's single was one of three collected off Kennedy in the final frame. It came on the first pitch after Rudy Regalado had connected with a single into short right to score Bill Harrell with the tying run.

Athlete Appeals Loss of Status

New York.—Lee Calhoun, Olympic and U.S. high hurdles champion, said today he will appeal to the Amateur Athletic Union for reinstatement of the amateur status he lost Friday by being married on the "Bride and Groom" television show.

Calhoun and his bride, the former Gwendolyn Bannister, of Stamford, Conn., received some \$2,500 in gifts, but that wasn't the main objection of the AAU. Secretary Dan Ferris of the AAU said that the TV show was "capitalizing" on the 23-year-old athlete's fame, and that therefore he would not give AAU permission for appearance on the sponsored show.

Calhoun, whose home is in Garf, Ind., and who attended school at North Carolina College, must first appeal to the Carolina AAU for reinstatement, and if his home association votes in his favor, the national body then would review the case.

TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

New York.—It was a little different when I was fighting. In 1935, when I won the title as a 20-1 shot against Max Baer, the heavyweight division was loaded with names and there was a young fellow called Joe Louis threatening everybody with a pair of dynamite-laden fists. I was to get to know Joe Louis fairly intimately two years later.

When you've got names like Louis and Baer as good foreign fighters like Max Schmeling and Paulino Uzcudun to add an international flavor, you've got a pretty good start towards prosperity. These names aren't around today and people are crying that boxing is dead. It has always been theory that without a good heavyweight division, boxing sleeps and dies. That isn't entirely true and never has been.

A "Dream" Fight
Take the bout between Sugar Ray Robinson and Carmen Basilio that the International Boxing club is putting on at Yankee Stadium on Monday, Sept. 23. It is a fight that would fit in whether it was in my time or yours. This is the "dream" fight that the public will pay for and it doesn't matter what the price of admission is. They'll go and see it because it has every element of punch, skill, drama and suspense.

This kind of match doesn't come along too often. It would compare to a Harry Greb-Mick Walker fight, or Billy Petrolle-Jimmy McLarnin for excitement potential.

Promoters today have to do the best with the available talent, just as they did years ago, although there was much more talent available then.

That doesn't excuse the Floyd Patterson-Pete Rademacher match that is being fought for the "heavyweight" title in Seattle on Aug. 22. There's no excuse for that one and it should be billed strictly as an exhibition if it has to be done at all.

As the so-called "Cinderella man" of boxing, it is difficult for me to eliminate a chance for Rademacher, but that chance is so slim, it would have to be a miracle. I was a professional, of more or less proven ability. Rademacher has never fought as a professional and his reputation as an amateur fighter, I have been told by writers who covered the recent Olympic Games, is not that of a great fighter, or even a very good one. Perhaps Patterson isn't great, as yet, but he is the best professional fighter among the heavyweights.

How would I rate the future of the heavyweight division? My opinion of Patterson is that he can achieve some measure of recognition as champion only if he fights the best. I feel that Eddie Machen is the best right now. He would not only be a test for Patterson but would constitute a threat because of his punch. After Machen, the class is virtually even. The "oldsters" like Nino Valdes, Archie Moore, Bob Satterfield are outsiders in the field.

My vote for the best prospect for the future is Alex Miteff, the Argentinian who seems to have everything and will get there if he is not rushed. Willie Parano, Roy Harris, Zora Foley are young and good but have a bit to go yet.

And as has often happened in boxing, some new young stalwart will come out of nowhere to bring back the punch and excitement and the sport, which has been often killed but never died, will be thriving and vibrant again.

Old Rider Breaks Leg

Del Mar, Calif.—Johnny Longden, the world's oldest, richest and winningest jockey, neared the end of the trail Saturday after suffering a double break in his right leg at Del Mar race track.

The 47-year-old rider, who has collected 5,090 victories in more than a quarter of a century of horse racing, lay in Scripps Memorial hospital at nearby La Jolla—with no misgivings about Friday's accident that may sideline him permanently from the game he loves.

Asked if this was the end of a riding life for him, Longden said: "I don't know. We'll wait and see."

Dr. R. V. Falt, the track physician, said "Johnny will be sidelined for at least six months. A double break like this is serious and at his age it will heal slowly—especially in view of the fact that it is near an old break."

Ironically, Longden had his leg broken by a 2-year-old filly named Royal Zaca, a daughter of Royal Serenade. Longden had ridden the latter to victory in the \$100,000 Hollywood Gold Cup a few years ago.

Royal Zaca started to flip over backwards in the gate. Johnny's leg was momentarily caught against the side of the gate and that caused the break.

Cleveland.—Virgil Akins, veteran St. Louis welterweight, clamored Saturday for a shot at the winner of the Ray Robinson-Basilio title bout, figuring he earned it by his upset eight-round technical knockout over Garnett Sugar Hart Friday night.

Referee Lou Parker stopped the fight after 49 seconds of the eighth round, but many ringers in the public auditorium felt he should have made the gesture midway in the seventh when a looping right hook dropped Hart for an eight-count, after which he arose and absorbed a merciless pasting.

Akins and the 10th ranked Hart of Philadelphia weighed 148 pounds each for their nationally-televvised bout.

Akins began hurting the 20-year-old Hart, who suffered his third loss in 25 bouts, in the sixth round with stiff combinations to the body. Hart seemed unable to protect himself in the seventh, during which he took a terrific pounding against the ropes.
