Sparks was shot to death by police after a wild shooting spree in which two policemen and a young woman were injured.

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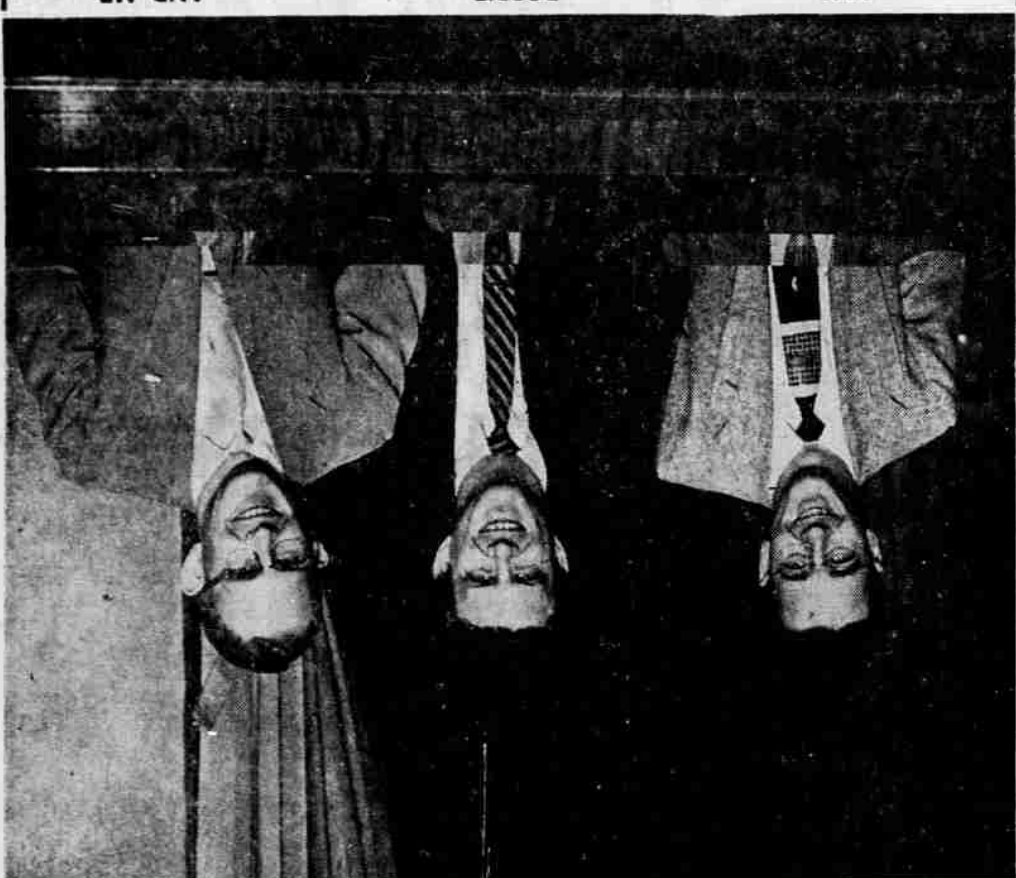


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
