Director Named For Alsea Study

Salem—The Alsea watershed study, ordered by the last Legislature as a comprehensive resource use basis for all areas of Oregon, will be directed by forestry and fisheries expert Don W. Chapman.

Chapman has been hired by the State Natural Resources committee headed by Gov. Robert D. Holmes to conduct the \$50,000 coastal stream study.

Cooperation of several state agencies, including Oregon State college, is scheduled for the unique study. First phase of the study will involve water gauging in the Alsea river and tributaries which drain parts of Lane, Lincoln and Benton counties.

Chapman, who holds a masters degree from Oregon State college, has been working there on pollution problems in fisheries. Previously he was with the Oregon Cooperative Wildlife Research unit at Corvallis and the U. S. Forest Service.

Miss America List Of Entrants Complete

Atlantic City, N. J.—Miss America Beauty Pageant officials today announced the complete list of entrants and the schedule of competitions in the annual contest starting Sept. 4.

Preliminary competition will be held in Convention Hall Sept. 4-5-6 with the 51 contestants divided into three groups. Each group will appear three times for judging in evening gowns, swimsuits and talent.

On Sept. 7 a list of 10 semifinalists will be named, and they will appear again in the evening gowns, swimsuits and talent categories. From five finalists the eventual winner and runner-up will be named after being scored on answers to a series of questions by a panel of judges.

There are entrants from all states except Montana, Washington and Wyoming.

Stocks Take Further Dip; Leveling Seen

New York—Stocks declined further today but appeared to be steadying at a level about exactly half way between the year's highs and lows.

At today's lows, just about half of the rise in industrials that took place from Feb. 12 to July 12 had been wiped out. Here and there stocks met support at their lows which showed losses on the day of one to three points, in some instances recent favorites had much wider losses.
