

Mantle Has Perfect Night As Yanks Rap Red Sox; Takes Over RBI Lead

Mickey Mantle won the first round in his private batting battle with Ted Williams and wound up knocking out the Red Sox at the same time.

Mantle, bent on retaining his American league batting crown, enjoyed a perfect night Tuesday night as he collected three hits in as many times up and drove in all of the Yankees' runs in a 3-2 victory over Boston.

Mickey's performance, which included his 32nd homer and a pair of singles, raised his batting average five points to .384. He still trailed Williams, who boosted his league-leading mark one point to .388 with a single and two walks in four trips.

Big Frank Sullivan was the victim of Mantle's homer which came in the eighth inning with one on and wiped out Boston's 2-1 lead. The blow not only enabled Mantle to take over the league leadership in runs batted in with a total of 83, but also helped the Yanks retain their 5 1/2 game lead. It marked Mickey's first homer in Boston this season.

Sturdivant Wins Tenth
Tom Sturdivant scattered seven hits in registering his 10th victory although southpaw Bobby Shantz was called in to nail down the final out.

Jim Rivera drove in five runs with a pair of homers to lead the White Sox to a 10-5 triumph over the Indians; Billy Gardner's second homer of the game with one on in the ninth gave Baltimore a 5-3 victory over Washington, and Kansas City scored a 14-inning 3-2 victory over Detroit in the nightcap of a day-night doubleheader after the Tigers won the opener, 3-1.

The Milwaukee Braves reeled off their eighth straight victory and stretched their National league lead to 6 1/2 games with a 12-4 decision over Cincinnati. The Giants defeated the Dodgers, 4-2; Bob Friend of the Pirates pitched a two-hitter in beating the Phillies, 6-0, and the Cubs snapped a three-game losing streak with a 6-2 victory over the Cardinals.

Southpaw Billy Pierce was supported by an 11-hit attack that included four homers as he registered his 16th victory even though he needed relief from Gerry Staley in the eighth inning. In addition to the pair of homers by Rivera, Sherm Lollar and Walt Dropo also connected for Chicago to hand Ray Narleski his first defeat since he became a starter on July 4.

Gardner connected for his game-winning homer off relieved Ed Black after having hit an earlier homer off Russ Kemmerer in the seventh inning as the Senators dropped their fourth straight game. Bob Neuman also homered for the Orioles. Connie Johnson went the route for Baltimore, scattering 10 hits for his 10th triumph.

Heavyweight Bout Called Worst Thing

Milwaukee, Wis. — Former heavyweight champion Joe Louis said today the "worst thing ever to happen to boxing" will be the Aug. 22 meeting between heavyweight title-holder Floyd Patterson and Olympic king Pete Rademacher for the "championship of the world."

Louis, who holds a place in the boxing "hall of fame," said the bout "is the worst mismatch in boxing history," out-doing Patterson's first title defense against Hurricane Jackson "for bad matching."

Louis, who was the most victorious heavyweight title defender in history, said Patterson was bringing "shame to his crown" by agreeing to fight the 28-year-old Rademacher, who'll be making his professional debut at Seattle.

Never Would Do It

"I never would have done a thing like that," said the Brown Bomber of the 1940's, "and neither would any other champion in boxing."

"The National Boxing association should withdraw its recognition of the Washington state boxing commission," said Louis, who is here to plug Mercury records. "The NBA will be a sorry body of men if they recognize that fight."

Fred Saddy, chairman of the NBA's rating committee, said the association has "no right to interfere with Washington's state autonomy" in this matter. "Besides," said Saddy, "if Rademacher would accidentally win, and it would have to be by accident as far as I can see, the NBA would look foolish by condemning Washington's boxing commission."
