Eastern Oregon Range Land Burns

None is included in the group used to calculate the averages. In that group many issues lost a point or more while one issue, National Steel, rose more than a point.

Navajo Living Standard Declared Decreasing Despite Cash Reserve

San Francisco — Testimony by a government witness in the Colorado river suit has disclosed that the standard of living for the Navajo Indians in Arizona is "decreasing" despite the fact the tribe has a cash reserve of \$50 million.

William Head of Gallup, N.M., director of the Navajo, Hopi and Zuni reservations, testified in federal court Wednesday in

support of the government's case for the Indians' rights in the controversy over Colorado river water.

Principal litigants in the complicated suit are Arizona and California. The government and several other state organizations have claims to be evaluated by Special Supreme Court Master Simon H. Rifkind.

Congress Considers Action

On direct examination by Wallace Kiechel Jr., Department of Justice attorney, Head testified Congress was considering welfare measures for the Navajos in an effort to improve their lot.

However, Arizona Attorney Mark Wilmer brought out on cross examination the fact that the tribe recently received \$33 million for signing gas leases on reservation lands and the natural resources on the reservation included three uranium mines, oil and coal deposits.

Head also said under cross examination by California's counsel Northcutt Ely the Navajos' cash reserve on deposit with the Federal Treasury was estimated at \$50 million.

Steam Plant Planned

Head said a large steam generating plant was to be located on Indian lands which would produce power "over much of the western part of the United States." He said the ready accessibility of large coal deposits makes the project feasible.

The Indian director estimated the number of Navajos having reservation rights to be about 82,000, but he admitted under cross examination he did not know the number of Indians who actually live on the reservation.

Head explained that even if an Indian left the reservation

he was still considered a member of the tribe and entitled to all tribal rights.
