The nomination was unanimously carried, and, pending Musil's acceptance, his appointment will be considered at the next Council meeting.



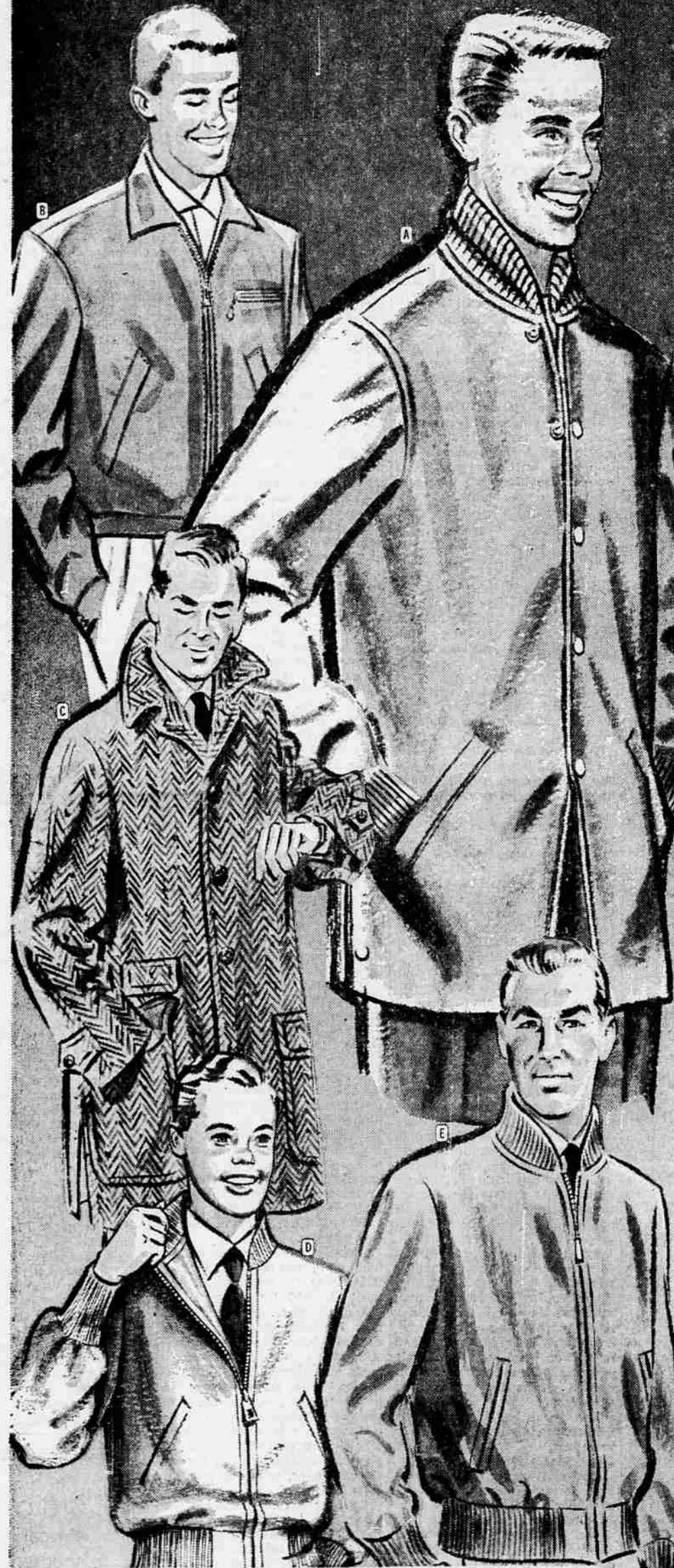
