

# Houtteman Pitches Win Over Hollywood, 7-3 Allowing Only Five Hits

Hollywood — Art Houtteman pitched the Vancouver Mounties to a 7-3 victory over the Hollywood Stars Saturday, scattering five hits and allowing only three walks, in a Pacific Coast League game at Gilmore Field.

The Vancouver victory ended a three-game winning streak by the Stars. It was the first Mountie win of the current series against two losses.

The victory for Houtteman was his third this year against three losses. Bennie Daniels (14-6) was the loser.

Bud Peterson was the top slugger for the Mounties, slugging out a home run and two singles. The homer, his seventh of the year, came in the fifth inning with the bases clear.

The Mounties collected four of their runs in the first inning on singles by Peterson, John Jorgensen, Cal Segrist and Joe Frazier and a double by Len Green. They added their other two tallies in the sixth on a double by Green, a single by Bob Hale, two Hollywood errors and a sacrifice fly by Charlie White.

Hollywood scored twice in the second inning on a double by Carlos Bernier, a Hollywood error, a grounder by Joe Duham and a single by Spook Jacobs. Their other tally came in the seventh when Duham was safe on an error, moved ahead on a single by George Vico and scored on a single by Jacobs.

Charlie Beamon (9-8) and Mel Held (7-5) will start for the Mounties in today's doubleheader against Hollywood's Hugh Pepper (2-7) and Don Rowe (5-5).

San Diego — Jim (Mud Cat) Grant hurled a four-hitter, scored a run himself Saturday as San Diego dropped Los Angeles, 6 to 0, in a Pacific Coast League contest here.

Grant was supported by three homers, two by Earl Averill.

The victors shelled lefthander Tom Lasorda for four runs in the second inning. Averill and Allen Jones bringing them in with homers. Jones' clout was worth three. It was his sixth of the campaign, while Averill led off the frame with no. 16 Jones connected after Ed Kazak and Bill Harrell lashed singles.

Los Angeles got its two off Grant in the third. Earl Battey was hit by a pitched ball and then Steve Bilko slammed a 430-foot homer over the right centerfield wall, his fourth of the series and 43rd of the year.

Babe Birrer took the mound for the Angeles in the fifth and was racked for a quick run when Grant led off with a single, reached second on Rudy Regalado's sacrifice and scored as Dave Pope sliced a double to left.

Averill nailed No. 17 in the eighth with none aboard.

It was the 13th victory against five defeats for Grant.

The win snapped a three-game losing streak for the Padres who will send Pete Mesa (8-7) and Ed Gasque (6-6) against Ralph Mauriello (7-3) and John Rancho (5-10) in the doubleheader wind-up this afternoon.

### Ideas Vary on Rademacher Chances Against Patterson In Thursday Night's Bout

Seattle, Wash. — Can an amateur fighter beat the heavy-weight champion of the world?

That's what Pete Rademacher is going to find out the night of Aug. 22 when he steps into the ring against title-holder Floyd Patterson.

Let's get some opinions.

On his way to winning the Olympic championship last year at Melbourne, Rademacher stopped the three opponents he faced. He got Dan Bekker of South Africa in three rounds, Josef Nemec of Czechoslovakia in two and Lev Moukhine of Russia in one.

The UP was able to contact only two of those fighters. Not even the press department of the Soviet Sports committee in Moscow could locate Moukhine. European boxing circles suggested he may have gone to Siberia shortly after his one-round defeat.

**Don't Rate Pete**

The other two don't think much of Pete's chances. At Johannesburg, where he is a policeman, Bekker predicted Rademacher won't last six rounds.

"Rademacher is very strong," he recalled. "He packs a punch that can floor an opponent, but he does not have enough of a knockout punch for a pro."

"Compared to Patterson I certainly am a 12th rate boxer, but Rademacher is not much better than I am. I just cannot see how he could beat Patterson. He won't survive six rounds."

At the town of Budejovice, Czechoslovakia, where he is a truck driver, Nemec said of Rademacher: "He is an extremely hard puncher, but I consider him too slow. When I fought him I took advantage of my greater speed in the first round and managed to escape his blows," he said.

**Makes Mistake**

"In the second round, however, I made the mistake of side-stepping instead of launching some counter-attacks. When I finally got exhausted and lost my speed as the result of tiring footwork, I was lost."

The 28-year-old Rademacher is an amateur, but an experienced one. He has been fighting for 10 years, says he won 78 to 79 bouts. But his professional qualifications are nil. He has, in fact, seen only two pro fights. He saw Kid Mathews in Seattle in 1953 and an "Eddie somebody" get clobbered in New York the same year.

His chief sparring mate is Negro Clarence Hinnant, variously reported as the sixth and ninth ranking light heavyweight. Hinnant is high on Pete.

"This will be the toughest fight Patterson ever had," Hinnant says. "There's a good possibility the champ will get

whipped."

Another member of the Rademacher camp is Joe Gannon, former light heavyweight who gave Patterson a tough fight three years ago.

Gannon predicts the boxing world is "in for the shock of its life."

**Predicts Crow Eating**

"A lot of boxing writers are going to have to eat the words they've been writing about this fight," Gannon says.

Rademacher himself is confident. He thinks the fight probably will go 15 rounds but that it depends on how Patterson fights. He sees nothing ridiculous in an amateur fighting the champ.

"I figure I've been trained like a pro, fought like a pro and I think like a pro," he says. "I figure I've improved tremendously in just the past month."

Boxing writers who have watched him work out agree that Rademacher can hit. But they claim he telegraphs his right and is uncertain of his footwork. He seems to wheeze after a few rounds, but that may be a natural condition as he breathes noisily even in repose.

Most bookmakers have taken the fight off their books. When Jimmy Braddock won the heavyweight title from Max Baer, he was on the short end of 20-1 odds, the longest price at which a heavyweight challenger ever went into the ring. The gamblers don't give Rademacher that much chance.

**Drain, The Dalles Clash in AABC**

Portland — The Dalles knocked defending champions City Beavers out of the Oregon AABC baseball tournament at Skavone field here Friday night when Denny Peterson shutout the Beavers 2-0.

Drain bumped McMinnville from the tourney with a 5-1 win behind the five-hit pitching of Jack Henkel.

The Dalles and Drain meet today and the other two teams still remaining on the roster, Showboat of Beaverton and Archer Blower and Pipe, tied last night. There were originally 16 teams entered in the double elimination event.

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
