New York — Stocks rallied again today, their first two-day rally of consequence since prices turned down after the market hit its 1957 highs July 12.

Net gains ranged from fractions to more than a point with several special gains of 2 to more than 3 points dotting the list.

Oil issues did better than other major groups in the industrial department. Gains ranged to more than a point in such issues as Amerada, Phillips, Standard of California and Standard of Jersey. Shell Oil rose 2 and Gulf more than 2 points.

Down-Jones final stock averages: 30 industrials 485.14, up 1.28; 20 railroads 147.26, off 0.21; 15 utilities 68.08, up 0.31, and 65 stocks 167.87, up 0.34.
