Macmillan Meets With Ambassador

London — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today called the senior U.S. diplomat here for urgent consultations on the Syrian crisis.

Macmillan met with Minister Walworth Barbour at No. 10 Downing Street in the absence of Ambassador John Hay Whitney who is in the U.S. on vacation.

Authoritative sources said they discussed the Middle East situation in general and Syrian events in particular in the meeting. Macmillan's first since he returned Thursday from his own vacation.

Macmillan, who once served as foreign secretary, has taken over responsibility for the Foreign Office in the absence of Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd, now on a holiday.

Diplomatic sources said before the Macmillan-Barbour session that the U.S. and Britain were in agreement against taking any direct counteraction against leftist moves in Syria.

Police Find Note Confessing Murder

The Dalles — Police here Thursday discovered a scribbled, unsigned note in which the writer confessed the slaying last Friday of Mary Matthews, 9.

The message was found in a pickup truck parked near the scene of the crime. The author said he planned to commit suicide by taking an overdose of sleeping pills. He said there would be no one to mourn him.

Police appealed to the writer of the note to identify himself and officers were dispatched for a search of transient "jingles," since the person had identified himself only as a "bum."

Mary Matthews died in a Portland hospital after being struck on the head by a blunt instrument as she slept outdoors with her playmate, Barbara Heldt, 10. The Heldt girl also was struck, but not seriously hurt.

"I play Bobo, a TV-type Tazan," Hargitay says proudly. "It gives me a good chance to show off my muscles."

"Our director, Frank Tashlin, said I had a good build so he put me in a pair of leopard skin trunks. In one scene I jump out a window — and they didn't use a stunt man, either."

Next to marrying Jayne, Mickey's ambition in life is to become an actor.

"I'd like to marry Jayne today," he said sadly. "But her divorce isn't final till Oct. 21. I hope we can get married right after that."

Hargitay, who won the "Mr. Universe" title in London in 1955, is a friendly, hulking man who stands six feet, three inches tall and weighs 220 pounds. He speaks with a slight accent (Hungarian) and is happy for an opportunity to talk about himself.

Most often interviewers ask questions about his buxom girlfriend.

The broad-shouldered strongman modestly denies that he lifts weights to stay in shape. He keeps his muscles toned on the golf course and in swimming pools.

"I come by my physique naturally," he said, somewhat defensively. "There isn't any law that a guy with muscles can't

be an actor, too. If they want me to act with my shirt off, that's fine with me."

"And that's not all," he concluded triumphantly. "Jayne likes my physique, too!"
