Citizens Bothered By Air-Rifle Boys

City police have recently received a series of reports of juveniles using "B-B" or pellet guns in the city.

Albert Ray Stocks reported on Thursday that two juveniles had shot several B-Bs at him and fellow workers on Bear Creek rd. between Jackson and McAndrews rds. The boys ducked into a group of new houses when chased. Stocks also said that earlier William W. Claypool, a tractor driver, reported he had been hit several times on the back of the head by B-Bs while working in the Bear Creek dam area.

Late Thursday afternoon it was reported to police that a 3-year-old girl had been shot with a B-B gun by two juveniles in Medford. The child was uninjured but frightened.

On Tuesday two juvenile boys were caught while shooting birds with a B-B gun, according to police reports.

Capt. Clyde Fichtner of the city police urged all parents to make sure the guns are not used, as they are illegal in Medford. The city ordinance reads that "pellet guns, bean shooters, sling shots or similar articles" are illegal. Anyone using these articles in the city could be subject to the maximum fine of \$50 days in jail and \$150 fine, he added.

Railroad Shares Go To New Average Low

New York — Railroad shares today sank to a new average low since Jan. 17, 1955, and pulled the whole stock market down with them.

Industrials broke through the recent low by a wide margin and touched their lowest level since last April 1. Utilities were around the years' low.

The rail situation was brought into the open when Erie cut its dividend. Erie set a new low on a loss of more than a point. Others declined fractions to more than a point.

American Youths Call for China, U. S. Interchange

Tokyo — Thirty-six of 41 American youths who visited Communist China over the objections of the state department today called for "free interchange between China and America," Peiping Radio reported.

The youths issued the statement upon their arrival today in Peiping. The government radio said the youths received "a rousing welcome" in the Red China capital. It added that the visitors were "holding hands, hugging each other and singing songs."

The Americans were among 90 young people who accepted a free trip to Red China following the World Youth Festival in Moscow.

In a statement broadcast by the New China News Agency, the youths who signed the statement declared:

"We feel that mutual understanding can best come about through friendly exchange by all kinds of individuals. The world has long recognized
