

# Stars Tumble Angles, 11-4; Mounties Extend Win String Over Padres by 3-1 Victory

Hollywood — The Hollywood Stars collected 12 hits, including three homers, today to dump the Los Angeles Angels, 11-4, in the first game of a three-game series at Gilmore field.

Fred Waters, turned in 6 1-3 innings of expert relief pitching, giving up only four hits and not allowing a score, to gain his fifth victory of the season against six losses. The loss went against Tom Lasorda (5-9), the first of three Los Angeles pitchers.

Los Angeles led off the scoring in the first frame with a single tally on a double by Tom Saffell, an infield out and a wild pitch.

Hollywood collected two unearned runs in the bottom of the first then added another tally in the second when Pete Naton tripled in Bill Causon who had walked.

The Angels came back with three runs in the third when Gale Wade slammed out his fourth homer of the year with Earl Battey and Bert Hamric aboard.

The Stars tied the score at 4-4 in the third when Jim Baumer slammed out his 13th homer of the year.

Hollywood clinched the game with a big seven-run fifth inning which was marked by a fight which took 10 minutes to settle. The heavy hitting of the inning included a homer by Fred Waters, his first of the year, and a three-run roundtripper by Naton, his fourth of the year.

During the inning, a close pitch by Lasorda made Spook Jacobs hit the dirt and Jacobs

retaliated by bunting the next pitch down the first base line. Lasorda rushed off the mound and made no apparent attempt to field the ball, but threw a flying block which knocked over Swinging.

**Players Join Fight**  
The skirmish brought players from both teams out of the dugouts and a second fight broke out between Battey and Naton. Several minutes later players and umpires broke up the fights after several punches had been exchanged. The only injury reported was suffered by Battey who had a cut lip. After a huddle, the umpires decided that no action would be taken against the players who had taken part in the fight.

The two teams met again tomorrow for a doubleheader. It will be their last meeting of the season.

San Diego, Calif. — Left-hander Don Ferrarese's four-hit pitching today carried Vancouver to its third straight victory over the San Diego Padres 3 to 1, in a Pacific Coast league contest at Lane field.

It was Ferrarese's third triumph in a row over the Padres, who have managed just two runs and 11 hits in 27 innings against the Baltimore Orioles farm hand. The hurler, who took an 8-5 record, also collected three of the 11 hits the Mounties mustered off Vic Lombardi and Dick Brodowski.

Vancouver scored its first run in the third frame and Ferrarese kept the Padres shut out until the eighth inning when he walked one to force in a run after San Diego had loaded the bases on two walks and a single.

The walk came with two away and then Ferrarese got out of the jam by making Earl Averill one of his nine-strikeout victims.

Third baseman Kal Segrist drove in what proved to be Vancouver's two decisive runs when he blooped a single behind first base to the eighth to score Ferrarese and Johnny Jorgensen, who both singled. Chuck Diering, who singled in the third in-
