

# Teenage Golf Star Wins Amateur Title

Sacramento, Calif. — Joanne Gunderson, a husky, 18-year old from Seattle, Wash., won the 57th National Women's amateur golf championship today with a convincing 8 and 6 victory over Mrs. Ann Casey Johnstone of Mason City, Iowa.

Neither player could equal women's par of 74 on the 6,368-hole Del Paso country club match during the championship finals. But Miss Gunderson, a five-foot seven, 140-pound slugger who belts the ball like a man was just too strong for the 34-year-old matron from Mason City, particularly from tee to the green.

She jumped into a lead on the very first hole of their scheduled 36-hole match by sinking a 20-footer for a birdie and she never was behind in the entire match.

For the morning 18 holes, Miss Gunderson medaled 77 to

a tired 82 turned in by Mrs. Johnstone. In the 12 holes that it took Joanne to close out the match in the afternoon, she was one over par while Mrs. Johnstone was five over.

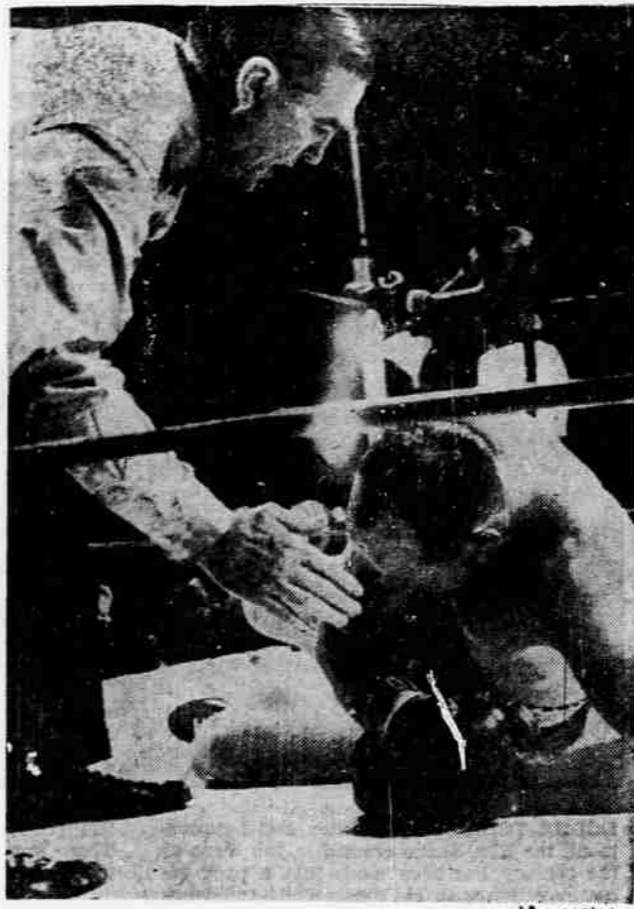
Miss Gunderson, a freckle-faced, red-blond youngster who hits those tee shots over their 225-250 yards, won the coveted National title on her second try.

Going into day's round, Mrs. Johnstone was seven under par. But she lost the touch against the long-hitting champion, splashing into the rough off the tees, spraying approaches in sand traps and putting badly.

Sacramento, Calif. — Joanne Gunderson, Seattle, Wash., and Ann Casey Johnstone, Mason City, Iowa, recorded Friday victories to gain the Saturday finals of the 57th National Women's Amateur golf tournament.

Joanne, a strapping 18-year-old with a powerful swing usually seen in a strong male player, won from Anne Richardson, Columbus, Ohio, 3 and 1 in her semi-final. Mrs. Johnstone, 34, mother of a five-year-old daughter, breezed by Carole Jo Kabler, Sutherlin, Ore., 7 and 6.

Casey turned a polished three-under-par performance on the Del Paso Country club course to walk away from the 19-year-old threat from Oregon. Miss Gunderson displayed even-par golf.

### Aussies Pose Problems to U.S. Netters

Chestnut Hill, Mass. — Australians Ashley Cooper and Neale Fraser dealt American hopes of recapturing the Davis Cup a severe setback today as they defeated the leading U.S. team of Vic Seixas and Ham Richardson, 6-3, 7-9, 10-8, 7-5, in a thrilling semi-final match of the National Doubles championship.

The second-seeded Aussies thereby qualified for the perennial American-Australian final tomorrow against top-seeded Gardner Mulloy and Budge Patty. They won their semi-final test today against fourth-seeded Australians Roy Emerson and Bom Mark, 6-2, 6-4, 6-2, before 4,500 fans at the Longwood Cricket club.

Wimbledon champion Althea Gibson and Darlene Hard also made the finals of the week-long tournament by whipping unseeded Jeanne Arth of Newark, N.J., and Pat Naud of San Mateo, Calif., 6-3, 6-4.

### North Dakota Split Into Three Time Zones

Bismarck, N. D. — North Dakota found itself split into three time zones for the first time this year when part of the nation shifted to daylight saving time.

The southwestern quarter of the state follows mountain time throughout the year, and until recently, the rest of the state stayed on central standard time.

But this spring Minnesota passed a law placing that entire state on daylight saving time. North Dakota cities along the Minnesota state line decided to go along with their Minnesota neighbors and also put their clocks ahead one hour.

Thus, until October, North Dakota will operate on central daylight saving time in the east, central standard time in the central and northwest portions and mountain standard time in the southwest.

### Kodak Employees Show Increase in Savings

Rochester, N. Y. — Eastman Kodak company employees saved \$4.5 million more last year than they did in 1955, according to the 1956 annual report of the Eastman Savings and Loan association.

James K. Killip, executive vice-president of the association which is linked to the firm, reported that savings in the institution rose to a record \$36,900,000—up 13.9 per cent over 1955.

Killip revealed that the association's assets reached \$42 million, making it fourth in amount of assets among the 159 savings and loan associations chartered by New York State.

Kansas City — The Baltimore Orioles today recalled left-handed outfielder Lenny Green from their Vancouver farm affiliate and said he would report in time to play in Sunday's doubleheader with the Chicago White Sox. Green, 24, was hitting .309 for Vancouver in the Pacific Coast league.

### Browns Rap Steelers In Pre-Season Game

Akron, Ohio — The Cleveland Browns took advantage of a weak Pittsburgh Steeler line tonight to win a 28-13 exhibition professional football victory watched by 28,000 fans here. Cleveland led the game in the third quarter with two spectacular scoring drives.

### Cleveland Indians Buy Los Angeles Hurler

Cleveland, Ohio — The Cleveland Indians Saturday announced the purchase of right-hander Vito Valentinetti from Los Angeles of the Pacific Coast league to bolster the pitching staff, weakened by many injuries this season. Valentinetti was expected to join the Tribe in time for tomorrow's doubleheader against the Washington Senators here.

### Flanagan Stops Jones

Jones, who fought on even terms with Flanagan through the early rounds, wearied and faded in the last three rounds as Flanagan finished in solid command.

Flanagan opened up a small cut over Jones' right eye in the eighth round, and jabbed relentlessly to victory.

Referee Johnny Stanton scored the fight 98-91 in favor of Flanagan while Judge Jim Perreault had it 99-92 and Judge John Deogitis scored it 99-90 for Flanagan.
