Monkeys Aid Study On Oxygen to Brain

Chicago — With the aid of monkeys, researchers at the Chicago Medical School and Mount Sinai hospital are trying to determine whether a change or deficiency in the supply of oxygen causes any brain damage during heart surgery.

The new techniques of heart surgery involve the use of the heart-lung pump or "artificial heart," and freezing, during which oxygen to the brain is reduced.

The researchers also are using rats to determine whether a pre-natal change in oxygen supply

Larceny Indictment Dismissed in Court

Portland — A larceny indictment against Multnomah County Deputy Sheriff George Minielly was dismissed here Friday after the state said it did not have enough evidence to prosecute.

Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding dismissed the indictment on motion of Assistant Attorney General Arthur G. Higgs. Minielly was accused in the bill of

participating in an illegal raid on the home of Raymond F. Clark, an employee of racketeer James Elkins.

Higgs said in his motion that Minielly was doing his duty when he conducted the raid and rightfully did not question the legality of the warrant issued by Judge John R. Mears.

TERMINAL TO CLOSE

Washington — The Army announced that the Seattle, Wash., Army Terminal, which has 860 employees, will close Oct. 1. The Army said 520 of the employees are expected to be offered new jobs.



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Earliest Marble Sculpture Uncovered

Chicago — A University of Chicago expedition has unearthed the earliest piece of marble sculpture ever discovered in the Corinthian district of Greece.

The expedition also discovered the sites of an early stadium and an ancient temple dedicated to the Palaimon at the Temple of Poseidon in Corinth.

Oscar Broneer, professor of classical archaeology, heads the University of Chicago expedition which since 1952 has been excavating the ruins of the temple near the eastern end of the Corinth canal.

Broneer said fragments of a large marble holy water basin dating to the seventh century B. C. were discovered in an ancient dump containing debris from a fire that destroyed the temple of Poseidon early in the fifth century B. C.

Rice Dish

Cooked rice mixed with plump raisins and sweetened whipped cream is most elegant served with a fresh raspberry sauce. If you prefer, put layers of the creamy rice mixture in parfait glasses with sweetened crushed raspberries between layers.

Cook a minced onion in a quarter cup butter until wilted. Add 2 peeled, coarsely chopped tomatoes and cook 10 minutes. Add 2 cups cooked large dry limas, salt and pepper to taste, and simmer until ready to serve. Extra good with outdoor meals.

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
