The victory was the first for the Metro squad since 1950, when they defeated State 8-0. State had won every game since then except the 1955 tilt, which ended in a tie.

Besides Schloredt, voted the most valuable player award, Metro's Jack Luhrs of Franklin was selected most valuable in the backfield, and Dick Miller of Benson high was voted most valuable lineman. For State, Gary Grill was most valuable back, and Astoria's Keith Korpella was voted most valuable on the line.

The confident 26-year-old San Franciscan fired a two-under-par 68 which won him the \$8,000 first prize. Five strokes behind him with 272s were Al Balding of Big Winn Inn, Ont., and the "Old Slammer," Sammy Snead, who each got \$3,500.

Kellert's were his 17th and 18th for the season and Sadowski's were No. 1 and 6. Sacramento hitters put together several neat scoring plays but it wasn't enough in the fifth inning of the nightcap Jim Westlake, Roger Bowman and Manager Tommy Heath were thrown out of the game for toothededly disputing a called strike.
