

Arizona Officials Arrest Pilot After Reckless Flying

Phoenix, Ariz. — Fred Manery, 24, Phoenix, was jailed today for investigation on a number of charges, including drunk and reckless driving of an airplane, following a wild flight which ended when the "borrowed" Piper Cub crash landed on a busy highway.

Manery, according to the sheriff's office, said he took the plane from Paradise airport near here to go to Tucson to look for a job. He said he figured he would make an "impression" that way.

Frightened Residents Harried law officers learned the plane was taken after numerous calls from frightened Phoenix residents reporting a low-flying plane. Garrett Powers, a special deputy who operates Air Havers Airport, flew after Manery but ran short of gas.

"I never saw such flying in my life," Powers said. "It was the damndest show I ever saw." He said the plane flew little more than 10 feet above the ground, circling trees and skimming power lines.

Manery, who said later he ran out of gas, crash landed on busy Highway 84, near Eloy, Ariz. It was dark and the plane had no lights, but only minor damage resulted when the craft crashed after banging against a stop sign.

Authorities here held Manery for investigation of grand theft. Pinal county deputies had three charges outstanding, one drunk and reckless driving. Manery also was wanted in the area where the crash landing occurred for flying without a proper license and for low flying.

81-Year-Old Portland Woman Killed in Crash

Portland — Mrs. Emma Stearns, 81, Portland, suffered fatal injuries here Monday when she was struck by a car at East Burnside and 60th avenue.

Police said the car was driven by Victor P. Reynolds, 51, Portland. He told officers he did not see Mrs. Stearns because of heavy traffic. He was heading west and the investigating officer said Reynolds was "also blinded by the sun on his windshield."

Convict Not Allowed Attorney Conference

San Rafael, Calif. — A judge has refused to let author-convict Caryl Chessman confer with one of the two attorneys he fired earlier this month.

Superior Judge Jordan L. Martinelli of Marin county denied Chessman's petition which complained that attorney Rosalie Asher was removed from the approved list of visitors to San Quentin prison.

Chessman claimed that Miss Asher "still represents petitioner on matters pertaining to publication of the book 'The Face of Justice.'"

Chessman dismissed Miss Asher and George T. Davis when he chose to serve as his own counsel in an appearance before Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman in San Francisco Aug. 14.

AFL-CIO staff members were told their boss plans to spend

"weeks at a time" at assembly sessions despite the press of AFL-CIO business.

That undoubtedly spells trouble for the Soviets. Associates believe Meany's blistering attacks on Communism will carry added weight in the world forum because he heads this country's 15-million-member united labor movement.
