Manager of the Ochoco Irrigation District, Coles also serves as first vice-president of the National Reclamation Association. He was one of the original committee which set up the Water Resources Board in Oregon.

Coles is a native of Haines in Baker county and has lived in Crook county for the past 30 years.

Little, who has been manager of the Consumers Power Company in Corvallis for nearly 11 years, served the Indiana Public Service Company for a time and managed the Sullivan County Electric Cooperative in Indiana. He is presently Oregon representative to the National Rural Electric Co-operative.

Opportunities available to the city from the Federal government's urban renewal plans were pointed out by Kenneth E. James, Home and Housing Finance agency representative, yesterday noon.

The Seattle man explained the program to city officials and interested businessmen at the Medford hotel. Medford has placed an application already for the "section 701" program, it was noted.

Approval is expected in several weeks. Medford's request in the section 701 is for a "master plan" of the city which would show areas in which "blight" is taking effect. The cost of the plan would be split between the federal and the city. The city planning commission would make the study.

Robert Duff, city manager, said the plan is for a land evaluation in which future parks, parking zoning and other needs would be mapped.
