

Mounties Overwhelm Beavers 13-5 With Eight Runs in Eighth

The Vancouver Mounties, playing desperate baseball in order to stay in contention for the Pacific Coast league pennant, unleashed a flash flood of runs against Portland Thursday night that should give the Beavers eighth-inning shudders for some time to come.

Luis Marquez hit a two run homer for Portland in the seventh frame to tie up the important game 5-5. At that moment it looked like the Beavers just might pull it off. But about five minutes later the roof fell in.

Buddy Peterson, Chuck Dierling and Jim Marshall hit consecutive homers off reliever Darrell Martin for four runs. Then the rest of the Mounties pitched in to add four more tallies and run the score to 13-5 where it stayed until the game's end.

Record Tied

The roundtrippers tied a Coast league record for consecutive homers off the same hurler. Oakland managed it against Portland in 1952 and Salt Lake did it to Vernon in 1923.

Despite the booming win, Vancouver remained four and a half games behind San Francisco, which came from behind to dump San Diego 7-3. In other games Hollywood beat Sacramento, 7-2, and Los Angeles whipped Seattle by another lopsided 13-5 score.

The Seals lackadaisical much of the time, also let it be known that they are playing for keeps. San Diego took the initiative in the sixth when a four run outburst to put it in the lead, 5-4. Then in the seventh, after the tying run had crossed home plate, Grady Hatton whanged a single into left field that brought home the two run win margin.

Leo Kiely won his 19th game against four losses after taking over from Bill Prout in the sixth. Loser Hank Aguirre, who played his last game in the PCL, moved to the Cleveland Indians with a 6-13 record.

Bennie Daniels won his 16th game of the year, giving the Solons only five hits while driving in two Hollywood runs himself. The biggest inning of the game was the fourth, when the Stars collected four on three walks, two singles and a two run double by Pete Naton. Marshall Bridges (9-15) lost the game and was replaced in the fourth by Mike Coen.

Two rookie pitchers, Steve Watson and George Michaels, gave up a total of 14 runs to the Angel lineup. Roy Hartsfield homered for Los Angeles and drove in six runs to boot. The Rainiers took a brief, one run lead in the first but Los Angeles quickly smashed Seattle hopes with four in the second to go in front and stay there.

Ray Robinson Returns to Ring Camp

Grenwood Lake, N.Y. — **AP** — Sugar Ray Robinson, who beat the promoters for a \$225,000 guarantee, asked this big question today: "Now that the fight's on again, can I get sharp enough in three weeks to beat Carmen Basilio?"

The middleweight champion, who returned to camp here Thursday night, admitted he had taken a "double gamble" last week when he called off next month's million-dollar title defense welterweight ruler Basilio and interrupted serious training.

"First, I risked losing a big purse and having my title vacated," he said, "and second, I risked being dull against Basilio and losing the title to him. Remember, I left camp on Aug. 18, two days before I called off the fight."

\$225,000 Guarantee

In the first gamble, he registered the greatest financial victory of his career Thursday before he agreed to go through with the Basilio fight at Yankee Stadium, Sept. 23.

After 10 days of bitter dispute with the International Boxing club and its ally, Theatre Network Television Inc., Sugar Ray was granted a guarantee of \$225,000 by TNT for permitting the fight to be piped into theatres. That sum could boost his total purse to about \$700,000.
