NORQUIST HAS ACE TO HIGHLIGHT 1st ROUND OF S. O. GOLF TOURNEY

Bob Norquist, young links man from University of Oregon and Columbia Edgewater club, Portland, wrote a sparkling episode for Southern Oregon Golf tournament history yesterday by carding a hole-in-one in first round championship flight rivalry of the 29th annual classic at Medford's Rogue Valley Country club.

Norquist accomplished the feat on the 175-yard No. 17 hole in his 2-up win over Harry Millette, one of the leading entrants of the home course. His first ace was a perfect shot, true all the way. It was one of the few holes-in-one in the annals of SO tourney play and the first, at least in many years, in the championship flight.

The ace was the highlight among opening round matches which saw two medalists tumbled and the third survive with the help of experience and Lady Luck. Favorites for the most part came through.

Lewis Beats Buch
Clayton Lewis, Medford, who admitted playing his heart out in a come-from-behind victory, was 2 up speller of Dr. Robert Buck, Medford, whose 71 in qualifying had given him No. 1 seeded position in the bracket. M. L. Hallmark, Roseburg, ousted senior division medalist, Larry Butler, Medford, 1 up.

Mrs. Marj. Fillis, Salt Lake City, Utah, women's low qualifier, was equal to the task when chips were down to overcome steady-playing Susan Small, Corvallis, 4 and 2.

Best title rounds of the day were turned in by Elaine Porritt, Eugene, and ex-champions Bob Atkinson and Dom Provost Jr., both of Columbia. Each was two-under par in recording championship flight triumphs. Miss Porritt subdued Mrs. Pat Eldswick, Ashland, 9 and 7. Provost belted John Robinson, Dunsmuir, Calif., 7 and 6 and Atkinson won 5 and 4 from Dale Liarrabee, Redding, Calif.

Attention on Men
Gallery attention today focused on men's championship

matches which got underway late this morning. Contestants in the women's and senior title brackets drew a day of rest. They have quarter-finals Saturday when the remaining men's championship contenders have their third round. Men's championship and first flight players have both quarter and semi-finals on Sunday while semi-finals are billed in all other competition. Finals are on Monday, Labor day.

Norquist's ace enabled him to take a 1 up lead on Millette. On No. 18 with Millette's ball on hard pan, and his swing blocked by a leaf, the Rogue Valley man moved the obstruction causing the ball to roll. Gez Millette called the stroke penalty on himself and conceded the hole and the match. He would have had to win the hole to square the match and send it to extra holes.

The Portlander medaled roughly four over par with a one-under 34 card on the back nine. Norquist was three up after five holes but Millette was even after nine greens. Then Norquist pushed ahead 2 up. Millette evened the tilt by 16, helping himself by downing a 40-foot putt.

Won With Even Par
Lewis won his match with an even par game. He was even with Buck after the second hole but lagged after that until winning the 12th and 13th to tie the action and the 17th and 18th to win. Buck had an eagle three on the first hole and, although taking a seven on No. 2, was one-under par at the turn.

Provost had four birds in his match but double bogied on No. 10 when he overshot the green. He is bidding for the crown he won in 1954. Atkinson, after his fourth toga here, had three birds on the front stretch.

One of the top matches in interest yesterday saw George Harrington, Phoenix, Ariz., with a one-under par game, come from behind and defeat Bob Prall, Salem, who was one over standard. Harrington had five
