

Quarter, Semi-Finals Due Today In Southern Oregon Golf Tourney

Youthful Biff Lovett, Grant high of Portland junior, encountered Dom Provost Jr., a Columbia-Edgewater clubmate, and George Harrington, Phoenix, Ariz., takes on Phil Getchell, Medford, this morning in the upper bracket of the championship flight quarter-finals of the Southern Oregon Golf tournament. Lower bracket matches in the 29th annual tourney at Rogue Valley Country club put Keith Gubrud, Eugene, against Lynn Creason, Harrisburg, Pa., and Bob Norquist, another Columbia player, against Bob McKevitt, Ocean Lake.

Winners will play in semi-finals this afternoon.

Mrs. Marj Fillis, Salt Lake City, and Sue DeVoe, Medford, tee off this morning in one women's championship flight semi-final while young Elaine Porritt, Eugene, and Mrs. George Calderwood, Eugene, are foes in the other.

Seniors Collide

In the senior semi-finals today M. L. Hallmark, Roseburg, meets a long time rival in Marvin Clark, Grants Pass and RVCC, and Robert Fox, Porterville, opposes Leland (Pete) Clark, Medford. Should the two Clark win it would be brother against brother in the Monday finale.

Championship flight tee-off times today are 9 a. m. and 2:10 p. m. for men; 8:20 a. m. for women and 12:10 for seniors.

All final matches in the tourney are Labor day with women's and men's championship contenders going 36 holes and the senior title flight contenders playing 18.

Creason, runner up for the title here last year, got his game together for the hottest title flight round of the day in the men's third round yesterday. He was three under par with three birds and the rest pars, hitting his shots down the middle and not missing the greens in a 6 and 5 win over George Cicirich, Eastmoreland. Cicirich eagled No. 7 hole with a wedge shot.

Gubrud, Norquist Go 19

Gubrud and Norquist had the toughest going to get into the quarter-finals, needing 19 holes to overcome Roy Morgan, Seattle, and Wayne Sabine, Redding, California, respectively.

Sixteen-year-old Lovett played even par to get by Alan Holmes, Medford, 2 and 1 in his Saturday third rounder. Both played well and were even at the turn. Lovett took No. 13 and 16 greens for his margin. Provost, titlist here in 1934, had a one-over par game in a 5 and 4 verdict over Jack Radford, Seattle, who had putting troubles. Dom was 1 up at the turn and took 10, 11, 12 and 14 holes.

Harrington, 1950 toga-taker, closed out with halves on 17 and 18, and a two over par performance in edging Verne Perry, Columbia, 1 up. He was 2 down after seven holes, even after the 10th and 2 up after 12. He lost 13, won 14 and then went back to 1 up on 16.

Near Ace on 15

McKevitt almost got a hole-in-one in closing out on No. 15 green with a 4 and 3 win over Leighton Tuttle, Eugene, and Oregon State college. After the close miss, the ball stopped about a foot from the cup and the Ocean Laker had an easy deuce. McKevitt was 2 up at the turn and 4 in front after 10 and 11. Tuttle took 13.

Getchell, 1954 runner-up, was also 1 up winner. His foe was Ed Hall, Medford. Hall had a

chance to square the fracas with a bird on 18 but an eight-foot downhill putt was just too tough to put in. Getchell was 1 up half-way and 2 up after 11 but lost 12 and 15 to pars which made it even. He took 16 with a par. Only time Gubrud was ahead in his match was when he took the extra hole to win it. He took the green with a conceded bird. Morgan would have won on 18 with a bird had his three-foot downhill putt gone. Gubrud sank an eight-foot sidehiller for a par to halve the hole. Down three holes after eight greens, Gubrud caught up with a bird on 17.

Downhill Putts Missed

Norquist was 1 up going into 18. On his second shot he was in the rough. He chipped to below the green and then chipped past the cup. He missed a short downhill putt and took a six on the hole. Sabine dunked a short putt for a five. Norquist got 19 with a par. The Portlander was 2 up after nine holes. He lost 11 but took 12. Sabine cut the gap to 1 up with a 30 foot putt for a deuce birdie on 15.

In the senior quarter-finals, Hallmark took Ted Porterfield, Long Beach, Calif., and Rogue Valley, 1 up; Clark beat Ralph Lomax, Portland, 3 and 2; Fox beat Medford Ingram, Salem, on the 20th hole and Clark was declared winner by default over Dr. Roy Reynolds, Salem.

Mrs. Fillis, mother of three, and winner of the Utah amateur crown, three of the past four years, turned back Mrs. Helen Davies, Medford, 3 and 2 in a Saturday quarter-final. Miss DeVoe, titlist here in 1934, had to go 20 holes to withstand the challenge of Mrs. Mary Scott, Rose City, Portland. The Medford lady plunked in a five-foot putt for an eagle three to claim the match.

Porritt Even Par

Miss Porritt played even par to subdue a fellow Eugene Country club player, Shirley Siegmund, 5 and 4. Mrs. Calderwood, who plays out of Laurelwood club, pulled away on the final stretch to trim Mrs. Ross Bunch, Medford, 3 and 1.

Miss DeVoe and Mrs. Scott were even after 15 holes of their battle. The Portland divotter claimed No. 16 with a par and Sue dittoed on 17 to even the chase again. Mrs. Scott had a big chance on 18 when Sue chipped short of the green and into the trap on her third stroke and the Portlander was on the carpet in three. However, Miss DeVoe had a nice out while Mrs. Scott three-putted and each took a bogey six on the hole. They halved the first extra hole with par fives.

Mrs. Scott was two up after seven holes in the scrap but Miss DeVoe evened by the turn. Sue went 1 up on 10 but Mary took 11 and 12 for the lead. Sue squared it on 13.

One Over Par

Mrs. Fillis was one over standard for the match. She took two holes with pars and four with birds. The Salt Lake housewife was 1 up at the turn. Mrs. Davies took 10 but Mrs. Fillis copped 12, 13 and 14 holes and got halves on 15 and 16.

Miss Porritt was 4 up halfway through her encounter and 6 up after 12 holes. She lost 13 when she went over the green and took a bogey but birdied the next hole where the tied ended.

Mrs. Calderwood was 4 up at one time on the front side but just 2 up at the turn. Mrs. Bunch took 10 to reduce the margin but Mrs. Calderwood restored 2 up on 11. The Medford entry

then won 13 and 14 to pull into a tie. Par gained Mrs. Calderwood the next three holes and the victory.

George Harrington, Phoenix, Ariz., downed Eddie Simmons, Medford, 2 up in the feature championship match Friday from the standpoint of hometown interest. Harrington, ex-RVCC manager and champ in 1950, shattered an old jinx with his first win in four Southern Oregon tries over the six-time champ of Medford's Labor day holiday event.

Big upset of the second round, however, saw Keith Gubrud, Eugene, tumble Bob Atkinson, Columbia, three-times SO champ. Gubrud, 21, who is just out of the Navy and will be a university of Oregon sophomore next fall, bettered Atkinson one-under-par game with three under to win 2 and 1.

The other ex-titlist in the tourney, Dom Provost Jr., Columbia, coasted by Milo Marlett, Eugene, 5 and 4. Two past SO runners-up, Phil Getchell, Medford, and Lynn Creason, scored second round decisions, but a third, Dick Bailey, Redding, Calif., was eliminated. Getchell nicked Woody Ball, Colwood, 1 up and Creason won over Bill Tallis, Hills, Calif., 4 and 3. George Cicirich, Eastmoreland, edged Bailey, when the former Northern California champ, hit his ball out of bounds on the extra 19th hole.

Norquist Torrid

Bob Norquist, Columbia and University of Oregon, who recorded the sensational hole-in-one Thursday, played a blazing four-under-standard to lash Warren Deakins Jr., Medford and Oregon State college, on Friday. Most decisive win of the day was 8 and 7 by Jack Radford, Seattle, over Ken McEwen, Monterey, Calif.

Alan Holmes, Medford, playing one-under-par and putting well, was victor 3 and 2 over Clayton Lewis, Medford, who had ousted medalist Robert Buck, Medford, on Thursday.

Harrington, playing about even par, never trailed in his match. He took the first hole when Simmons drove his pellet out of bounds and the second with a 60-foot chip for a bird. The ex-Rogue Valley player was 2 up at the turn and went 3 up on No. 10 hole with an 18-foot putt for a birdie. He lost No. 12 when his approach shot went into a tree and he took a bogey but the spread went back to 3 up on 13. Simmons's short putt for a par rimmed the cup and failed to go in.

Bird Conceded

The Arizona player lost No. 17 to Simmons when he took a five on the par three hole. His tee shot dropped to the left of the green. His tough chip over a hump rolled well past the cup. A long putt and a shorter one then failed to go down for Harrington.

On 18 Simmons trying for a birdie four rimmed the cup and conceded a four to Harrington who had made a nice chip on the green. Simmons, a bulldog at match play, would have had to win the hole to stay in the fight.

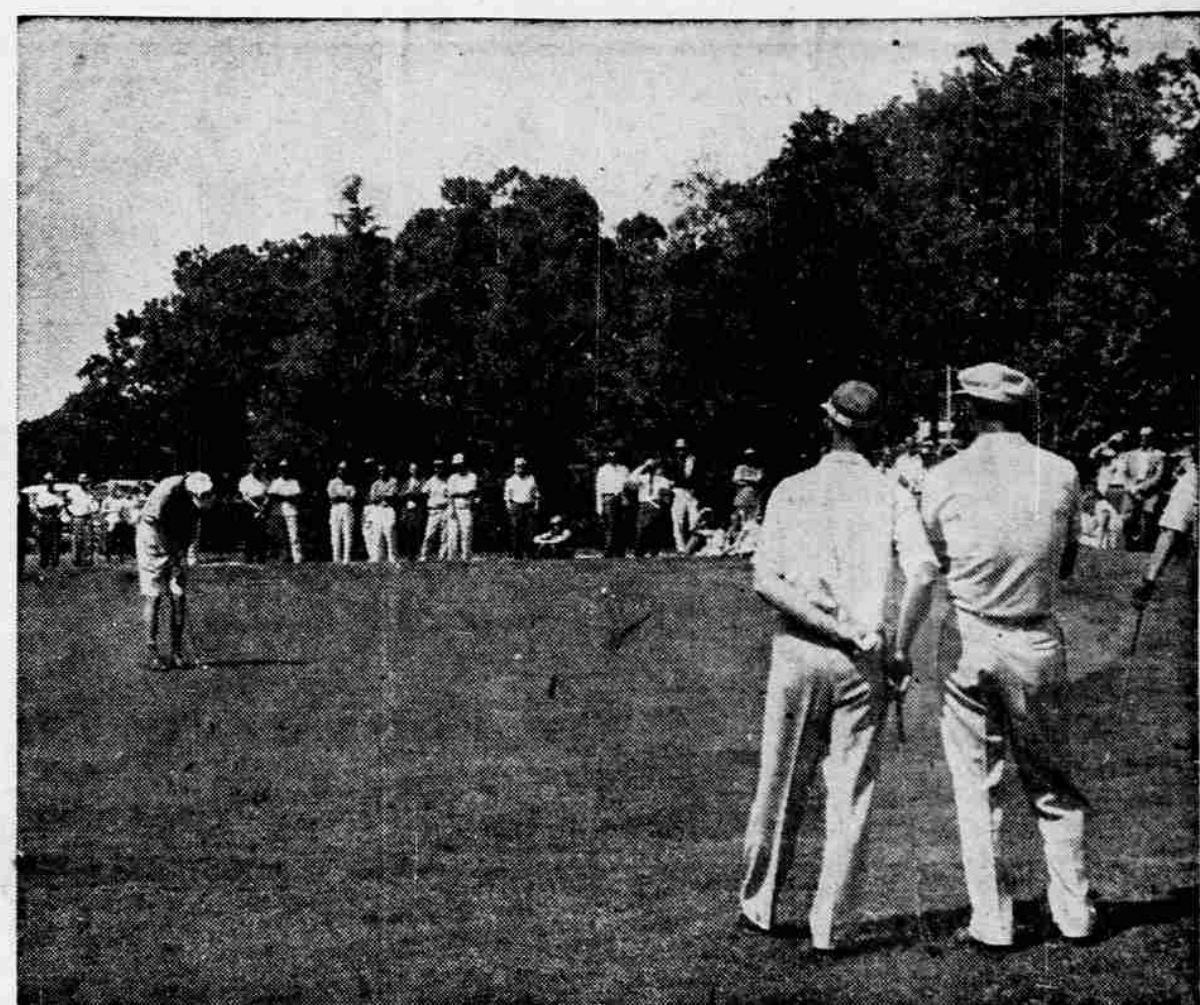

The Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals, still hoping for the "miracle" that might put them back in the National league pennant race, defeated the New York Giants and Chicago Cubs Saturday to slice a half game off the Milwaukee Braves' first-place lead.

The Braves, however, had an opportunity to regain their seven-game lead over the Dodgers and their 7½-game bulge over the Cincinnati Redlegs in one of Saturday night's five major league games. The entire

American league schedule was under the lights—Detroit at Cleveland, Boston at Baltimore, Washington at New York and Chicago at Kansas City.

Gino Cimoli hit a key two-run double in the sixth inning and Ed Roebuck pitched three hitless relief innings and contributed a homer as the Dodgers whipped their arch-rivals for the second time in 24 hours.

Roebuck, retired 10 of the 11 batters he faced after taking over with a 5-4 lead in the sixth to gain credit for his seventh victory compared to two losses. Marv Grissom, 41-year-old relief ace of the Giants, suffered

his fourth defeat. The Cardinals got their winning run in the ninth inning when Dick Littlefield, third Cub pitcher, walked Don Blasingame on four pitches to fill the bases and Joe Cunningham on seven to force in Eddie Kasko. The loss went to Turk Lown, appearing in his 56th game.

Don Cardwell pitched a four-hitter and hit his first big league homer to pace the Philadelphia Phillies to a 7-1 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates in the other afternoon game. Frank Thomas' nineteenth homer of the year in the second inning provided Pittsburgh's only run off Cardwell, who hadn't won a game since May 26.

Detroit — Jack Regas drove the fleet Hawaii Kai III to victory in the final heat of the 12th annual Silver Cup race on the Detroit river today winning the cup with a total of 1,100 points.
