

Beavers Skin Mounties 3-2; Stars Nudge Solons in 10th As Seals Fall to San Diego

Portland, Ore.—A throwing error by Owen Friend on the second half of a double play ball cost the Vancouver Mounties a Pacific Coast League game Saturday afternoon as the Portland Beavers edged them 3-2 in Multnomah stadium after 10 innings.

The game had been tied up twice, and tightened as Vancouver finished a scoreless tenth. Dizzy Trout walked Solly Drake in Portland's half. Drake moved around on a sacrifice and an infield out, and scored on Friend's error.

Both teams had not scored by the end of the fourth frame.

Frazier Scores

In the fifth, Joe Frazier singled, went to third on Don Moitoza's single, and scored the first Mountie run on a single by Erv Palica.

Portland tied it up in the seventh after Luis Larquez singled, was moved by a single and a sacrifice, and went home when Ed Wincenlak fled out.

In the eighth, Chuck Diering was clipped by Portland hurler Don Kaiser. Diering went to second on a wild pitch, to third on an infield out, and home on an error by shortstop Ed Wincenlak.

Home run No. 11 by Bob Borkowski in Portland half of the eighth tied it up for the last time.

Kaiser went the distance, and now has four wins against four losses. Loser Trout now has 0-1.

Hollywood—The Hollywood Stars collected an unearned tally in the tenth inning Saturday to edge the Sacramento Solons, 3-2, in a Pacific Coast League contest at Gilmore field and extend their winning streak to six consecutive games. The victory gave the Stars a 3-0 advantage in the current series.

The victory was credited to Bob Garber (9-7), the last of three Hollywood pitchers. He turned in sharp relief pitching during the last two innings and didn't allow any hits.

Seven Hits Allowed

The loss went against Milo Candini (7-6), who took over in the eighth after Sacramento starter Earl Harrist had allowed the Stars only five hits during the first seven innings.

Sacramento scored single runs in the first and the fourth frames. The first tally came on a single by Jim Westlake and a triple by Jim Greengrass and the other run was on a homer by Greengrass, his seventeenth of the year.

Hollywood scored a run in the sixth when Spook Jacobs walked, advanced on a single by Tony Bartirome and scored when Jim Baumer hit into a double play. They added another tally in the ninth on Triples by Bartirome and Paul Pettit and scored the winning run when Candini walked Bartirome with the bases loaded.

San Francisco—Preston Ward, pinchhitting in the fifth frame, blazed a three run homer that crumpled San Francisco's defense and gave San Diego a 6-4 win over the Pacific Coast League leading Seals Saturday.

Ward, a left hander, took over the batting chores for Bob Diptiero when Seal Manager Joe Gordon replaced starter R. W. Smith with Bill Abernathie, a right handed hurler.

The home run put San Diego into a three tally lead from which it faltered only briefly and gave the Pads a 2-1 edge over San Francisco in series play.

Smith Replaced

Smith, who permitted two men on base before Abernathie took over, was charged with the loss. He is now 10-10. Jim Grant was credited with the win, his fifteenth against six losses.

San Francisco opened the scoring with two runs in the first frame off two San Diego errors. The Pads tied it up with two of their own in the fourth when Diptiero scored on a single and Bill Moran crossed home plate on a sacrifice.

Then, Frank Kellert hit his nineteenth homer of the year for the Seals to put San Francisco into a one run lead. San Francisco got one other run in the sixth when Chip Aspromonte singled home Eddie Sadowski.

Aspromonte, plays his last games in the Pacific Coast League tomorrow before going to the Boston Red Sox. He hit two for four in today's game.

Many Cities Use Garbage as Landfill

Chicago—A survey to find out what American cities do with their garbage shows that most of them use it as landfill.

As for hogs, they run a poor third in getting rid of garbage, the survey by the International City Managers association revealed.

Most cities over 5,000 population use the sanitary landfill method of refuse disposal, digging a trench, compacting the refuse and covering the site so the land can be used for light construction, parking lots, or playgrounds. A total of 484 cities use this method, the survey showed.

Open dumps are used by 311 cities, 110 feed garbage to hogs, 109 use incinerators and 34 use salvage methods. A handful of cities dump refuse into water, make compost of it, use a central grinder or a reduction method, according to the survey.

Policemen Crack Down On Speed of Trains

West Newton, Pa.—Traffic officers here recently cracked down on speeders.

But the violators weren't behind the steering wheels of automobiles. They were behind the throttles of railroad locomotives. Ten engineers were "tagged" for violating a 30-mile-an-hour speed limit through the heart of town.

The restriction was imposed two years ago following a train-truck collision in which five persons were killed and the business district was torn up by derailment of boxcars.

Airliner Building Requires 'Frogmen'

San Francisco—The building of jet airliners now requires "frogmen" who also are engineers.

The Boeing Airline company has a new method of pressure testing done in a giant tank. The plane bodies are submerged in the water, but they must be escorted in the dunking.

Boeing discovered that several of their engineers were week end skin-divers. At present about 12 men are taking a special course in the use of face masks, rubber fins, and oxygen tanks.

The \$100,000 test tank is 130 feet long and holds 400,000 gallons of water for the aquatic engineers to get around in.

Indians Preparing for Opening of New Bridge

Payment, Mich.—Citizens of this Indian village at the eastern tip of Michigan's Upper Peninsula are preparing for the opening of the Mackinac Bridge in their own way.

The new 99 million-dollar structure will open this fall. And the Indians will be ready.

Executive Suggests Use of Bundling Board

Boston—An auto-club executive here is in favor of "bundling boards" in automobiles for love-stricken youngsters. At least, said Philip C. Wallwork of the Automobile Legal Association, that would keep them apart.

"There is nothing more disconcerting," he said, "than to watch a young driver in the car ahead trying to steer while in the octopus-like grip of a sweet young thing."

Town Finally Gets Its Firehouse

Dunstable, Mass.—Rome wasn't built in a day—and neither was the Dunstable firehouse. It took the town 314 years to get around to it.

The fire station, which was designed by the 79-year-old fire chief, Walter (Pop) Savill, was dedicated recently.

Savill said the townspeople had used "Yankee ingenuity" in fighting fires ever since the town was settled in 1643. He said formerly neighbors helped each other to douse house fires. In real emergencies they called the fire department in nearby Tyngsboro.

And Pop said, it was Yankee ingenuity they used in finally building a firehouse. One of the "new" fire wagons is a revamped oil truck salvaged from a junk heap. Another was hand-made by a local insurance adjuster.

The brick firehouse was built by local workers from sketches made on the back of an envelope.
