Mrs. Roosevelt's Column to Appear in Mail Tribune

New York — Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt left yesterday for a month-long visit to Soviet Russia, flying from New York to Moscow. She hopes to be permitted to travel extensively throughout the U.S.S.R. and to meet and talk with people in all walks of life, as well as seeing the many government representatives she has met here in her work with the United Nations.

Mrs. Roosevelt, whose syndicated column "My Day" appears in leading newspapers throughout the United States, will make the trip as a working newspaperwoman, and has arranged to cable her column to American readers twice each week.

After her return home on Sept. 30 she will be free to write without fear of censorship. The Mail Tribune will carry 10 or 12 articles giving a detailed report of her observations.

Although her actual itinerary is dependent upon the approval of Moscow, Mrs. Roosevelt has indicated that she is particularly eager to visit Leningrad, the city formerly called Stalingrad, to observe its reconstruction and rehabilitation since World War II, and to travel down the Volga, visiting Tashkent and Samarkand before going to Yalta, the scene of her late husband's historic conference with Churchill and Stalin.

Dr. Joseph A. Porcello, 51, admitted carrying the stones in his doctor's bag the 25 miles from his home and hurling them at the window, police said.

His "gesture of protest" was against the church's refusal to stop the wedding of his daughter, Claire, 19, to her former high school English teacher, Frank Peters, 30, failed to harm the window.

It also failed to stop the marriage. The wedding took place at 11 p.m., as scheduled, and while Porcello was being arraigned on a disorderly conduct charge, the couple set off on their honeymoon.

Porcello pleaded guilty to the disorderly conduct charge and was released on parole until Sept. 13, when he will be sentenced in magistrate's court.

Paper Investigation Ruled Out For Year

Washington — A Federal Trade Commission investigation into the production and distribution of newspaper has been ruled out this year.

Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) appeared in vain for Senate action before adjournment of Congress. He said there may be "concerted" rise in newspaper prices in the next few months.

Magnuson, chairman of the senate commerce committee, told the senate Friday that possible anti-trust actions might be brought against the industry as a result of the FTC investigation.

He said the FTC had on six other occasions looked into newspaper prices and once obtained an indictment for anti-trust violation. Magnuson said there should be a "continuing" investigation.

Senate action was blocked by Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) who said the FTC already has ample authority to carry out such an inquiry and Senate action was "absolutely unnecessary."

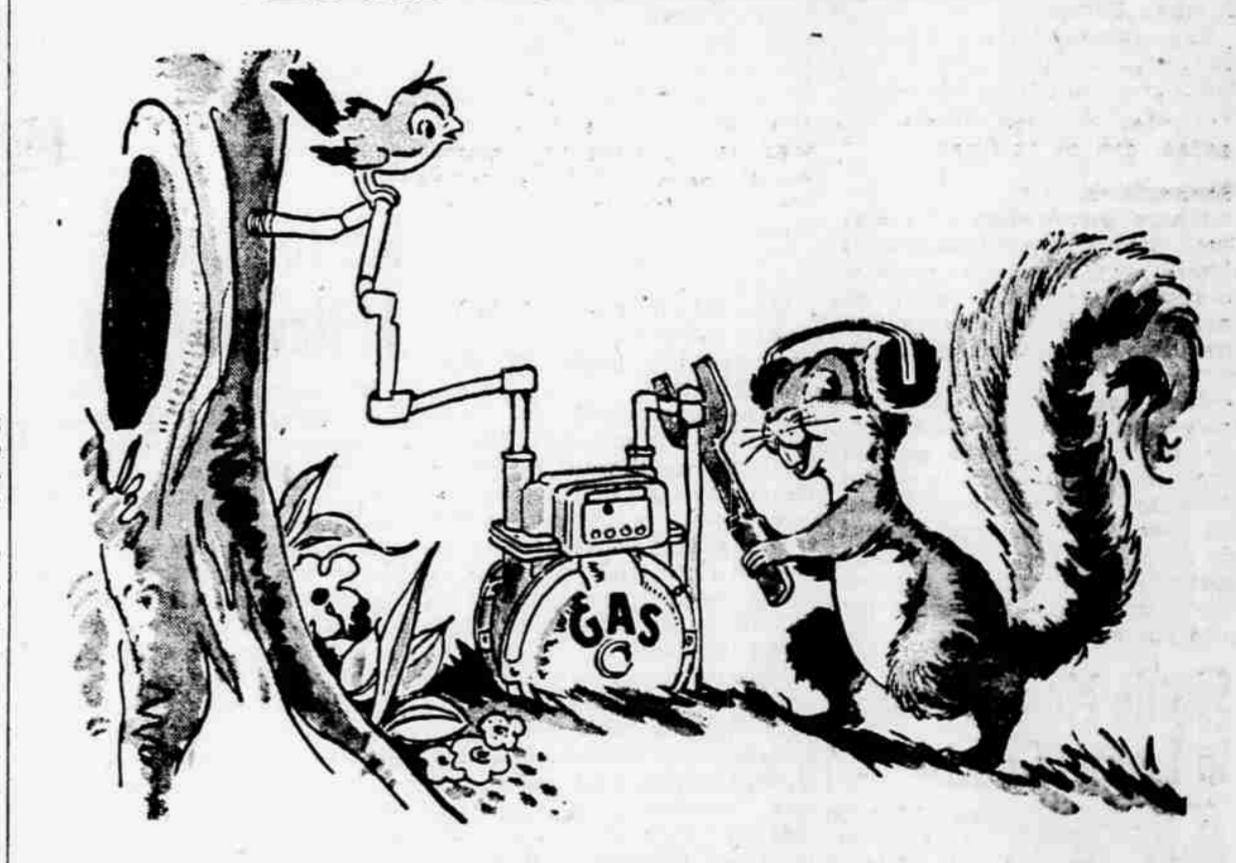
