

News About Books From the Library

"A large library like this." Our patrons and visitors often use this phrase, and it never fails to surprise us and perplex us. Is our size being judged by the dimensions of our building, or perhaps from the population we serve?

Judged by other standards the Jackson county library is actually very, very small—something less than half a library, in fact, according to American Library association standards. According to the association's definition of library standards a library serving fewer than 100,000 people (we serve 60,000) should have a minimum collection of 100,000 volumes of currently-useful materials. Your Medford public and Jackson county library has just over 41,000 volumes, of which more than 13,000 are children's books.

In addition to books an adequate library for such a population would have a collection of 250 films, 1,500 long-playing records, and 300-400 periodical titles. Your library receives 100 magazines and has no funds for films or long-playing records.

For each 2,500 population in the area served there should be at least one full-time person on the staff; and at least one-third of the staff should have professional education in librarianship according to American Library association standards. That would bring our present staff of seven up to 24, including eight graduate librarians, of which your staff now includes exactly one. Leaflets describing American Library association standards, and leaflets pertaining to your own county library, are available to you at the circulation desk.

Library Rescheduled For Fall and Winter

Jackson County community libraries have announced new schedules of opening hours for the fall and winter months.

Commencing Sept. 1, the Butte Falls, Eagle Point, and Jacksonville libraries will be open every Monday from 7 to 9 p.m. The Central Point, Gold Hill, and Phoenix libraries will be open on Tuesday evenings at the same hours. The Rogue River library will continue its Wednesday evening openings until further notice, and plans for the Talent library will be announced later.

For Convenience
It is hoped that opening the community libraries one evening each week will make it convenient for families to visit the libraries together, according to Helen Webster, county librarian, and will also make it possible for persons who are employed during the day to obtain books and magazines.

Each library is also open for differing afternoon periods during the week. Schedules can be obtained from the librarians of the community agencies.

In addition to the branch libraries, deposit libraries of 100 books are furnished to county communities now without library service. Additional stations can be supplied by arrangement with the librarian. Miss Webster said wherever an individual is willing to undertake its housing and care.

Oregon Resolution Passes Senate Friday

Washington—The Senate Friday passed a resolution offered by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) authorizing President Eisenhower to issue an official proclamation calling upon the people of the United States to commemorate appropriately the 100th anniversary of Oregon statehood in 1959.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) was co-sponsor of the resolution, which had to be acted upon before President Eisenhower could issue the proclamation.

Neuberger said he conferred just prior to the Senate vote with Anthony Brandenthaler of Baker, chairman of the Oregon Centennial commission, regarding Federal participation in the event.

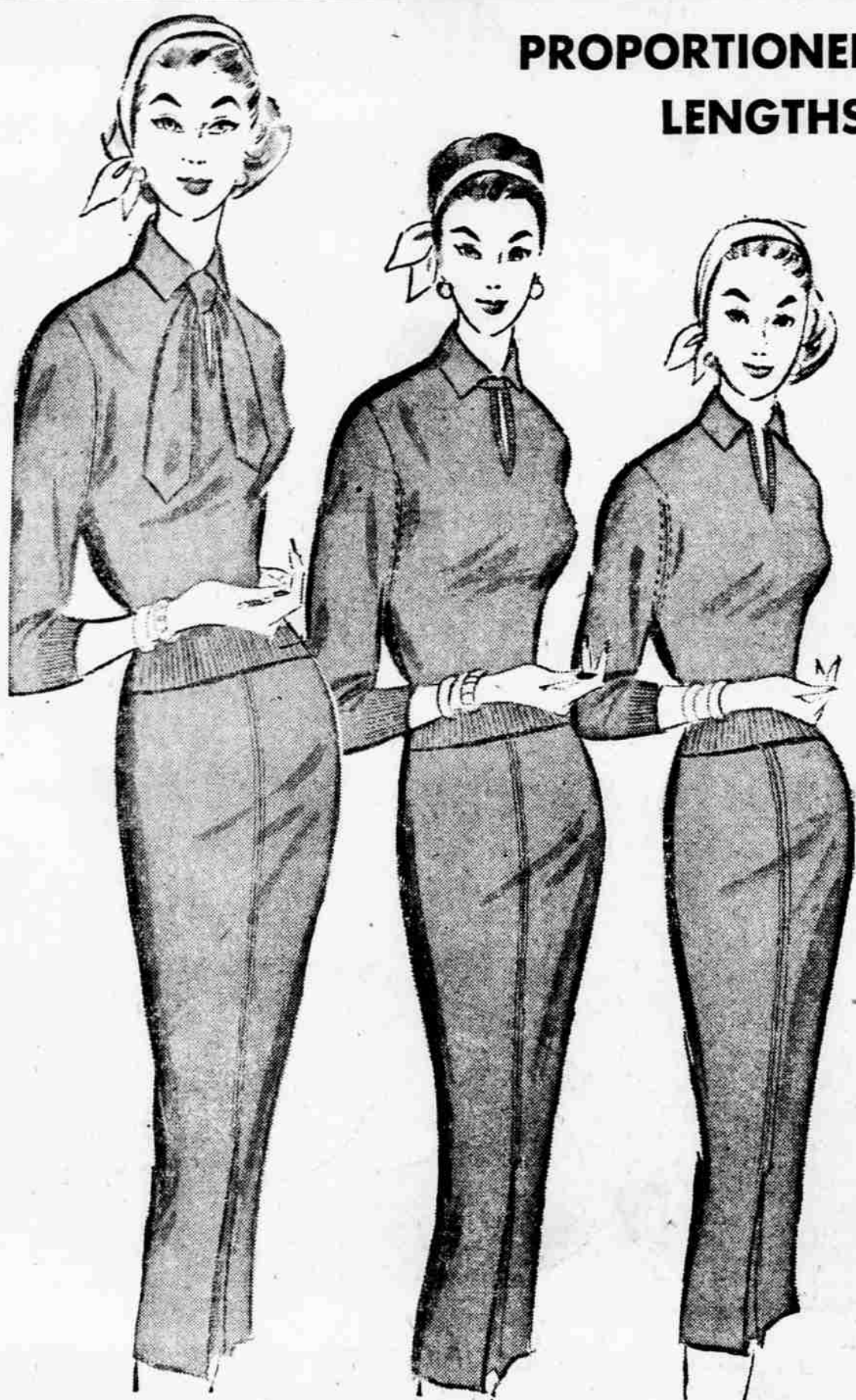
The resolution now goes to the House, where passage may be delayed until early in 1958 because of adjournment of Congress, although Sen. Neuberger said this was not yet certain.

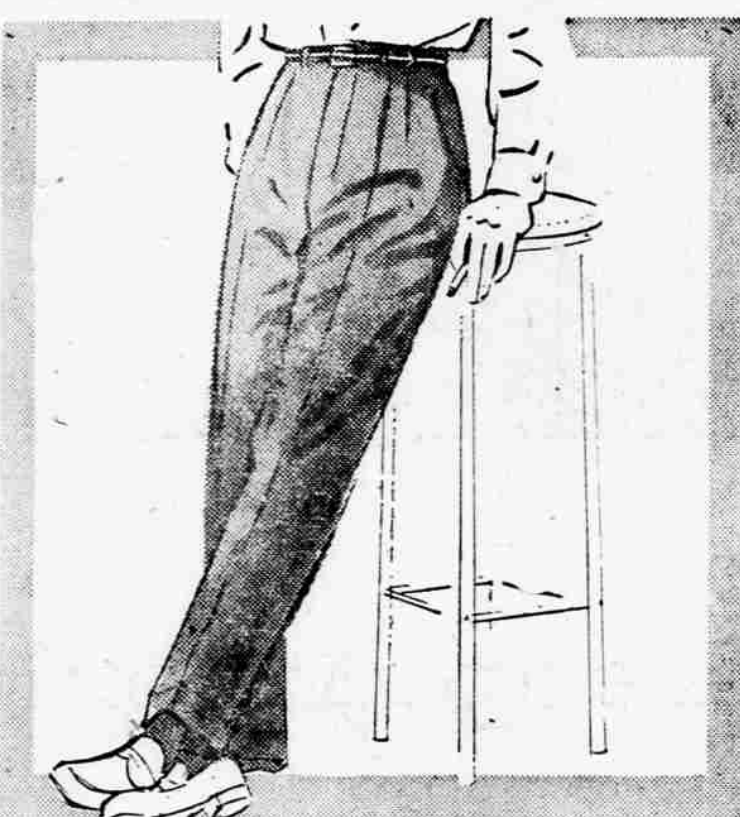
