

President Challenges Russia To Make Next Disarmament Move

Washington — President Eisenhower today challenged Russia to make the next move toward an East-West disarmament agreement.

The President, speaking at his news conference, took a pessimistic view of an early break in the disarmament deadlock.

He said he does not now see any further constructive step the United States and its allies can make on disarmament at this time.

Something, he said, must happen on the other side—referring to Russia.

Change Not Likely
Eisenhower added that a Soviet policy change does not seem likely, but there could possibly be some change in the Kremlin's position which is not visible at the moment.

Disarmament negotiator Harold E. Stassen has returned to London from conferences here for a meeting this afternoon of the U.N. Disarmament Subcommittee.

He may hear Russia's official answer to the West's 11-point, "first step disarmament" proposal. Soviet negotiator Valerian Zorin already has rejected it informally.

No plan calls for air-ground inspection against surprise attacks, suspension of nuclear weapons testing for two years, a ban on production of fissionable material for weapons purposes, and a start on reduction

of armed forces and conventional arms.

Officials Pessimistic

Officials in Washington are pessimistic about Soviet acceptance of these terms. There is widespread fear that the disarmament talks are headed for failure and adjournment.

The President did not disclose whether he has given Stassen any new instructions. In this connection, the President referred to his statement on Aug. 28—after the Soviet's denounced the West's disarmament plan and claimed development of long range missiles.

The President said at that time he was deeply disappointed at Russia's "scornful words" and "boastful statements."

Elvis Presley Rocks For Portland Fans

Portland — Elvis Presley—singer, voice, hips and guitar—arrived in Portland Monday and "shook up" 500 screaming teen-agers at Union Station by ducking out from the far end of the train.

In the evening, however, he rock and rolled some 14,600 fans in Multnomah stadium in a one-night stand.

Driver Dies In Stock Car Race

Darlington, S. C. — Speedy Thompson of Monroe, N. C., won the grueling Southern 500-mile stock car race Monday averaging 100.094 miles per hour. But the 8-year-old classic was marred by the death of a driver.

Bobby Myers of Winston-Salem, N.C., died in a hospital operating room after a spectacular three-car crash on the 28th lap when he slammed into Monty Flock of Atlanta, who spun on the tricky third turn. Myers flipped and landed nose first. Paul Goldsmith of St. Clair Shores, Mich., crashed into Myers.

Flock was reported in serious condition. Goldsmith was less seriously injured. The race was halted for an hour after the wreck.

Cotton Owens of Spartanburg, S. C., driving a Pontiac, finished second and Marvin Panch of Gardena, Calif., in a Ford, took third place.

Tulane Coach Expects Game

New Orleans — Tulane University football coach Andy Pilney seemed satisfied "with Army's word" today despite a congressman's threat to cancel the Army-Tulane game because of a ban on racially-mixed sports in Louisiana.

Pilney refused to talk about the politics of the ban. He said he was satisfied with Army's word that the game would be played.

Rep. James Fulton (R-Pa.), said he would protest to the White House and "strongly urge cancellation."

"What's the use of a civil rights law by Congress if Army disregards civil rights and cooperates in their repression," Fulton said.

Lt. Gen. Garrison H. Davidson, superintendent of West Point, said "we made our contract four years ago and we're going to honor it."

Boston — The Washington Senators announced Monday they have signed Ralph Lument, a Milford, Mass., left hander who attends the University of Massachusetts, to a bonus contract estimated at \$35,000. "I'll use Lument as soon as possible," said manager Cookie Lavagetto. "What have I got to lose."

Eisenhower Vetoes Veteran Loan Bill

Washington — The White House today announced President Eisenhower had disapproved by pocket veto a bill to provide low interest government housing loans for veterans in rural areas and smaller cities.

The President held that the bill was discriminatory and inflationary.

Under the measure the Veterans Administration would have received additional mortgage funds to be loaned to veterans in rural areas and small cities and towns at interest rates well below the current market.

The bill was intended to aid veterans in areas where conventional mortgage money was in scarce supply.

"I cannot approve a program that has such a potential inflationary effect upon the economy or that is so discriminatory," the President said in a memorandum signed Monday. "There is no justifiable reason for making loans at interest rates below the current market available to some veterans and denying them to others."

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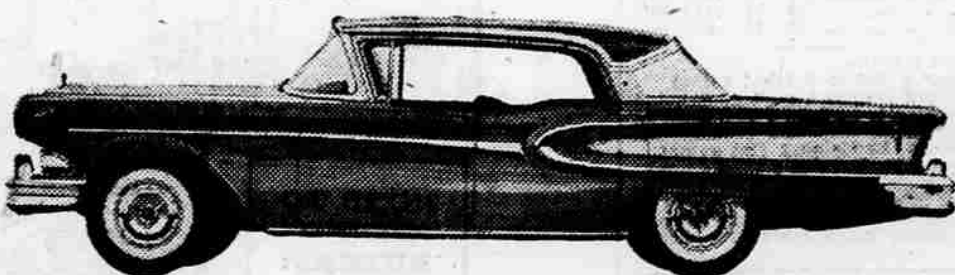
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The Edsel's distinction is easily seen in the classic vertical grille, the low, wide flight deck, the elegant lines of the cars shown here.
