Writer Describes Working Sessions at Religious Conference

Oberlin, Ohio—What happens when theologians from 47 different churches sit down together to discuss their "honest differences" about religion? To find out, come sit in one of the working sessions of the North American Conference on Faith and Order.

This eight day conference on the campus of Oberlin College is the first of its kind ever held in this country.

It has brought together lead-

ers of major Protestant and orthodox denominations to explore their common bonds of faith and the differences which still stand in the way of creating a single big church.

Split Into Sections

Each morning, after a worship service, the 500 delegates and observers split up into 12 separate sections to discuss specific problems of Christian unity.

Section two has attracted the greatest interest. Its job is to define "areas of consensus and conflict in doctrine."

Section two holds its day-long meetings in a typical green walled college classroom, on the ground floor of an ancient stone building facing the main square of the Oberlin campus. The chairman is Dr. Edward M. Carlson, president of Augustus Adolphus Lutheran College at St. Peter, Minn. He sits behind the professor's desk on a small, raised platform in front of the blackboard.

Catholic Present

The official participants, including such noted theologians as Professor Robert L. Calhoun of Yale Divinity School and Dr. John A. Mackey, president of Princeton Theological Seminary, sit in widearmed student chairs arranged in a semi-circle about the room.

In the back row, listening intently, but never taking part in the formal discussions, is the Rev. Gustave Weigel, a leading Roman Catholic theologian, who is here as an "unofficial observer."

The session begins with discussion of a long paper written by Calhoun, attempting to express what all the churches believe about Jesus Christ.

It finally becomes clear that in all of the widely-divergent Christian traditions represented in the room, there is no real disagreement about the tremendous affirmation which is the central theme of Calhoun's paper: That Jesus Christ is "truly God and truly man" and the "unique mediator of God's forgiving Grace" to sinful man.

Boy's Body Found In Columbia Slough

A spokesman for the coroner's office said an autopsy would be performed with the consent of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Cole, Portland.

It is presumed the boy drowned in the slough.

Flying Finn Again Jailed on Charge Of Court Contempt

Los Angeles—Charles C. Finn, one of the flying and fasting twins, today was back in the news. He began a hunger strike after he was sent to jail in the latest episode involving the brothers' surplus plane.

The 42-year-old Finn pushed aside his dinner Wednesday night. He was ordered to sign a letter assigning the plane over to International Airports, Inc., to satisfy a mortgage claim.

Said No Contemptuous

"As long as I'm wrongfully held I will refuse to eat," Finn said. "It is not contemptuous to disobey an unlawful order of the court such as this phony piece of paper that orders us to sign away our airplane."

Finn's brother, George, was not present when Superior Judge Leon David ordered Charles to jail for contempt of court. George was reported recovering from injuries suffered in an automobile accident. He has been ordered to appear in court Sept. 11.

The Finns had waged a five-year battle with the government for the possession of the out-dated plane. On one occasion the brothers staged a 70-day hunger strike while in prison at Springfield, Mo. In 1955, they went on three protest fasts.

Ruled Legal Owners

The twins three years ago were ruled the legal owners of the plane which they brought from the Vineland School District near Bakersfield, Calif., in 1952. But the government appealed the ruling and the Finns have yet to gain possession of the World War II Curtis Commando which has been standing at Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., since 1953.

Parts of Nation Get First Taste of Fall

The northeastern quarter of the nation got a foretaste of the fast approaching autumn season today with temperatures plunging into the 40s in sections of the Great Lakes region.

Although fall still is two weeks away, clear, brisk weather and a colorful display of northern lights over the upper Midwest brought a vivid preview of things to come.

Overnight readings in the northeast quarter were as much as 20 degrees cooler than the night before, ranging from the 40s to the 50s over much of the area.

In the West, readings in the mountains dropped to the 30s while the desert Southwest remained hot with overnight temperatures in the mid-90s.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms occurred during the night from the Dakotas southward through Kansas, with the heaviest amount at Russell, Kan., with .75-inch in six hours. A few light showers also dampened sections of New England.

Forecasters said cooling will continue today from New England and south through Kentucky and Tennessee. However, a warming trend is expected over Minnesota and Iowa.

A few light showers are expected over Northern New England, the Southeast Atlantic and Gulf states and the Northern Plains.

Early morning lows included 46 at Green Bay, Wis., 54 at Minneapolis, 52 at Detroit, 67 at New York, 75 at Atlanta and 65 at Los Angeles.

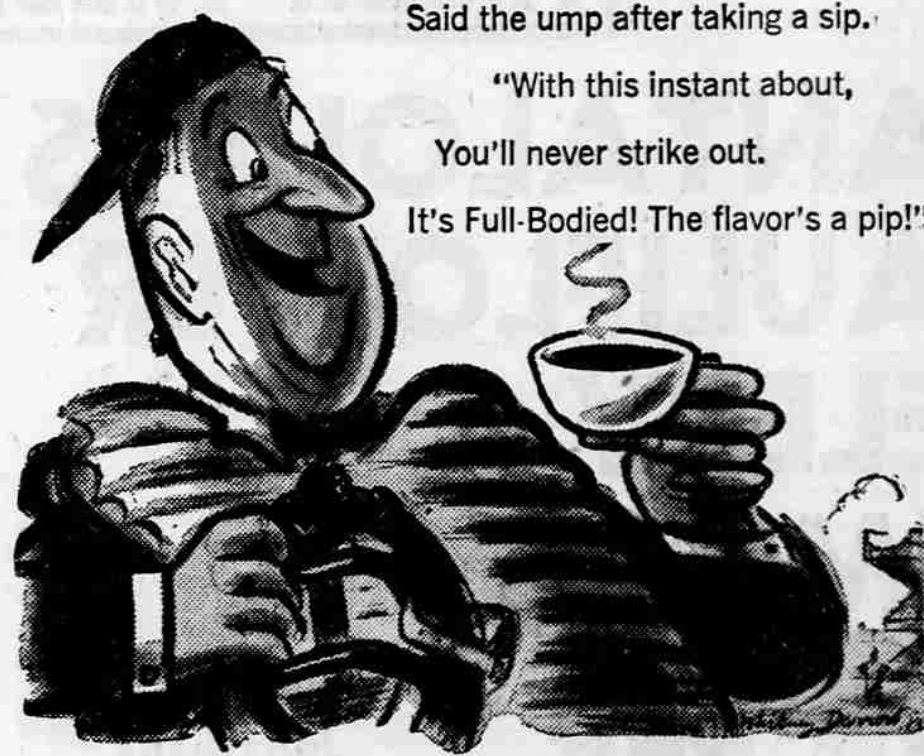
