

Church Services in Germany Reviewed in Student's Letter

(Editor's Note: David Frohman, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Frohman, 1554 Spring st., is in Germany this summer as an exchange student under the American Field Service program.)

The Mail Tribune asked him before he left to write a series of articles on his experiences, several of them concerning churches and religion. Following is one of his letters concerning this field of life abroad.)

Molln in Lauenburg, Germany—A few weeks ago I attended the church here and found the services quite interesting. The first thing which struck me was the magnificent and elaborate interior of the church. It had beautiful stained glass windows and the colors were very nice throughout. The sanctuary is quite the same as it was 400 years ago in the Middle Ages. Another thing that was different was the dress of the congregation. Boys came in jeans and leather shoes (the leather shorts so popular in Germany) and I saw very few Sunday suits. This type of dress is due mostly to the large number of hikers and travelers among the young people who come into town to church from the camping places before continuing on their trips.

The service itself starts with about one-half hour of organ music and hymns. They sing quite a lot in their church—at least five hymns with eight or nine verses each. Sometimes the choir and congregation alternate verses. Scripture, especially from the Psalms, is read often and several times the pastor chanted invocations. The sermon was quite formal and a bit more academic than in our churches. The pastor didn't talk to the people but talked more in the fashion of a lecturer. It was perhaps similar to the Jonathan Edwards type. I understood very little, but was told by the family that the sermon was good.

Church membership in Germany, unfortunately, has one big drawback, and that is the 10 per cent added taxes which church members must pay. This is because the church and State are not separate as in America, and taxes support the church.

A "state church" is forbidden by law but the Government must perform certain services to help the two churches. Church membership itself is about equally divided between Protestants and Catholics. Northern Germany, where I am living is mostly Protestant and Southern Germany is predominantly Roman Catholic. The Jewish people, almost wiped out by Hitler, are beginning to return, but their number is still very small.

As I reported before, the young people have many different opinions and beliefs. I think that the war has given many of the younger generation a very materialistic view on religion, and many times I have run across strange views. However, religion and belief in God is often a topic of conversation among the young people, and in this way each individual develops and expresses his own ideas.

Another reason for rejection of the church by many teenagers could very well be due to the religious training. Every Protestant teenager must have his Confirmation and to prepare for it entails two years. The clergymen are often very strict with their pupils and thus many of the students develop a dislike for it and all concerned with the church.

Religion is also studied in school with separate classes for Protestants and Roman Catholics. This is held twice weekly for the nine years of high school, and in it the history, teachings, literature and philosophy of religion are discussed. The popularity of this class depends mostly on the teacher. If he is

tolerant and encourages discussion, the class is liked very much. If on the other hand, a teacher forces his own ideas on the students, one can easily see why the church loses its appeal.

Protestants Discuss Church Unity at Meeting

Oberlin, Ohio.—Church leaders said today the rites of baptism and communion which once figured prominently in the splitting up of Christian denominations may now serve to draw them together again.

A surprising degree of agreement on the two central sacraments of the Christian faith has emerged at the Oberlin college conference where 47 Protestant and orthodox churches are now seeking a basis for unity.

There are still some profound differences among the churches represented here about the meaning of baptism and the Lord's supper. But many of the doctrinal disputes which bitterly divided Protestants of past generations seem to have spent their force.

Episcopal Bishop Stephan F. Bayne of Seattle, Wash., who presides over a conference section on the sacraments, said discussions so far have disclosed a "substantial measure of common ground." The conference began last Tuesday and will continue through Sept. 10.

Two special reports on baptism were presented to the conference today. One, by an interdenominational study group from the Pacific Northwest, declared that remaining differences are of "secondary importance."

"We have in baptism and the Lord's supper a clear path to Christian unity," this group said.

Another regional study group, from churches in the Newark, N. J., area, took the more cautious view that "in baptism we have at least a partial realization of the unity we seek."

Both groups attached particular importance to the fact that virtually all Protestant and orthodox baptisms now recognize as valid baptisms performed by other denominations. Some Baptist churches are the notable exception to this rule.

"Even the Roman Catholic church," the Newark report noted, "may recognize the baptisms of many Protestant churches, providing it was done with water and in the name of the Trinity."

days, this will "wind up" the series of articles I have written from Molln. I would like to give a general "summing up" with a few of my thoughts.

Germany, today, as a republic is once again taking a leading place among the nations of the world. Its astounding recovery from the war is one of the economic miracles of this century (a fact for which United States foreign aid can take much credit).

It is very enlightening to be seeing a foreign nation from the inside rather than from a tourist's eyes. If a person thinks of Germany as the place where boys sit yodeling on a mountain top dressed in peaked hats and old costumes with a wild flower in one hand and a beer mug in the other, he is mistaken. If he thinks of Germany now as the place where 15 years ago fanatic Nazi youth screamed, "Heil Hitler," he is equally mistaken.

Since Molln is off the "beaten track," only a handful of Americans have even seen it. Nevertheless, to anyone contemplating a European trip, Molln, in the province of Schleswig-Holstein is a must. I heard a fitting comment from one of my friends here. He told me, "I don't like Molln, I love Molln."
