City Street Tree Planting Group Is Developing Overall Master Plan

Medford's street tree planting committee is hard at work developing an overall master plan for this city's street trees.

The volunteer group began last February when the city council restored to local residents the privilege of planting trees between property lines and the streets.

For most homeowners, this means planting trees in "parking strips" or parkways.

Already Have Trees
A good many parking strips already have trees, planted long ago. A number of these were the wrong type trees for their setting, and their roots have cracked sidewalks, branches interfered with power lines, and leaves clogged sewers and drainage systems.

Some years ago the city decided to solve tree problems by prohibiting tree planting altogether between the lines of private property and the city streets.

This resulted in new subdivisions laid out with bare, uninviting streets.

The council last February attacked the problem from a new angle. The object was to provide street attractiveness without causing damage and interference with utilities and sidewalks.

Tree Ordinance
Under the street tree ordinance adopted by the council, residents may plant their parking strips only with trees prescribed in a "master plan" to be drawn up by a committee.

All committee members are volunteers and work without salary. They include Mrs. O. A. Eden, general chairman; Mrs. Fred Lorish, landscape architect and chairman of the landscape division; Claude McIntyre; Mrs. Minnie G. Ball, representing the Medford garden club; Vernon Thorpe, public works director for the city; and Chester E. Corry, Ashland landscape architect.

First step in drawing up a master plan is to inventory all trees now growing between property lines and city streets.

Mrs. William Tucker is in

charge of this, assisted by John Gribble, retired forest service supervisor. Inventories include size, condition, spacing, location and types of trees.

This job is almost completed.

Landscape Committee
Meanwhile the landscape committee, which has the aid of consultant Clifford Cordy, county horticulture agent, has drawn up plans for several sections of the city.

The time for planting is near. Ideally, young trees should be put in the ground between the latter part of October and the first days of freezing temperatures of winter.

Paul Jorgenson, 324 Groveland ave., was the first Medford citizen to take action under the new ordinance. He contacted residents on his street last spring and arranged to order trees for them.

A few days later, Mrs. James Dunlevy, 408 Ardmore ave., did the same for residents of her street. A local nurseryman brought trees to the Jorgenson and Dunlevy homes, where the neighbors picked them up for planting.

Other Streets
This fall, other streets will be planted with trees in the same manner. Mrs. Roland Hubbard, East Fairview dr., has organized her neighbors in a project for Fairview. Robert Johnson, 20 Hillcrest dr., has headed a tree planting project for that street.

Rogue Valley Land company, developers of the Country Club Manor subdivision, has agreed to plant trees for home owners in that area.

Any Medford resident wishing more information on the tree planting ordinance pertinent to his own situation should contact the city manager.

Though the committee plans trees for streets, residents are not required to plant. However, when they do plant any tree on their parking strip, it must be the one specified on the plans.

Intersection Planting

All plantings at street intersections must be at least 25 feet back along the streets from the

point where the curbs meet.

No tree may be removed from a parking strip or city property without the permission of the city manager.

Several of the plans now prepared are listed below. They include streets, types of trees selected, and the number of feet left between trees.

Eastwood and vicinity — Barnes st., European clump birch, 100 to 120 feet; Oregon Terrace, European clump birch, 140 to 160 feet; Stratford ave., European clump birch, 140 to 160 feet; Barneburg ave. (Oregon to north end) Fastigata oak, 140 to 160 feet; Barneburg ave. (Oregon to north end) Fastigata oak, upright, 50 to 80 feet; Oregon ave., Norway maple, 50 to 60 feet; Berkeley Way (Jackson to north end) Naden or Kwanzan cherry, 40 to 50 feet; Keene Way, crimson king mple, 50 to 60 feet; Willamette ave. (East Main to Eleventh) fruitless mulberry, 50 to 60 feet; Vancouver ave. (East Main to Eleventh) Norway maple, 50 to 60 feet.

Eastside — Dellwood ave. (Groveland to Modoc) red oak 90 to 100 feet; Modoc ave. (East Main to Barnett) European birch, 100 to 125 feet; Windsor ave. (Woodlawn to Modoc) European birch, 100 to 125 feet; Ardmore ave. (Keene Way to Siskiyou) Norway maple, 50 to 60 feet; Linwood st. (Keene Way to Siskiyou) Norway maple, 50 to 60 feet; Groveland ave. (Keene Way to Siskiyou) Schiedler maple, 50 to 60 feet; Highland dr. (East Main to Siskiyou) red horse chestnut, 50 to 60 feet; Siskiyou blvd., sweet gum or liquid amber, 75 to 85 feet; Keene Way, crimson king mple, 50 to 60 feet; Berkeley Way, already planted; Barneburg ave. (south) as is; Glen Oak Court, as is; Richmond ave., as is; Oakwood dr. (Barneburg to Modoc) red oak, 80 to 90 feet; White Oak dr. as is; Black Oak dr. (East Main to Barnett) sweet gum or liquid amber, 75 to 85 feet; Fairview Place (East Main to Foothill) flowering cherry or Daybreak, 40 to 50 feet; Hillcrest rd. (East Main to Hillcrest rd.) tri-colored beech, 40 to 50 feet.

Country Club Manor — Country Club dr., sweet gum, 75 to 80 feet; Black Oak dr., sweet gum, 75 to 80 feet; Sandy Terrace, Norway maple, 50 to 60 feet; Walden Place, ascending elm, 75 to 80 feet; Cerritos ave., Norway maple, 50 to 60 feet; Sutter ave., Ginkgo (male) 75 to 80 feet; Lindero ave., ascending elm, 75 to 80 feet; Havana ave., Cinko (male), 75 to 80 feet; Stanley ave., ascending elm, 75 to 80 feet.

Westside — Murray st. (Columbus to Peach) Paul's scarlet hawthorne, 40 to 50 feet; Mt. Pitt ave. (Chestnut to Peach), Pat's scarlet hawthorne, 40 to 50 feet; Winchester ave. (Chestnut to Peach) Paul's scarlet hawthorne, 40 to 50 feet; Peach st. (Dakota to Stewart) Washington thorn hawthorne (white), 40 to 50 feet; Hamilton st. (Dakota to Stewart) Washington thorn hawthorne, 40 to 50 feet; Plum st. (Dakota to Stewart) flowering plum (Thundercloud), 40 to 50 feet; Wilson Place, little leaf lichen spotted on property lines between garage and house, every other house; Jay st., red horse chestnut, 50 to 60 feet; Jasper st., red horse chestnut, 50 to 60 feet; Whitman ave., red horse chestnut, 50 to 60 feet.
