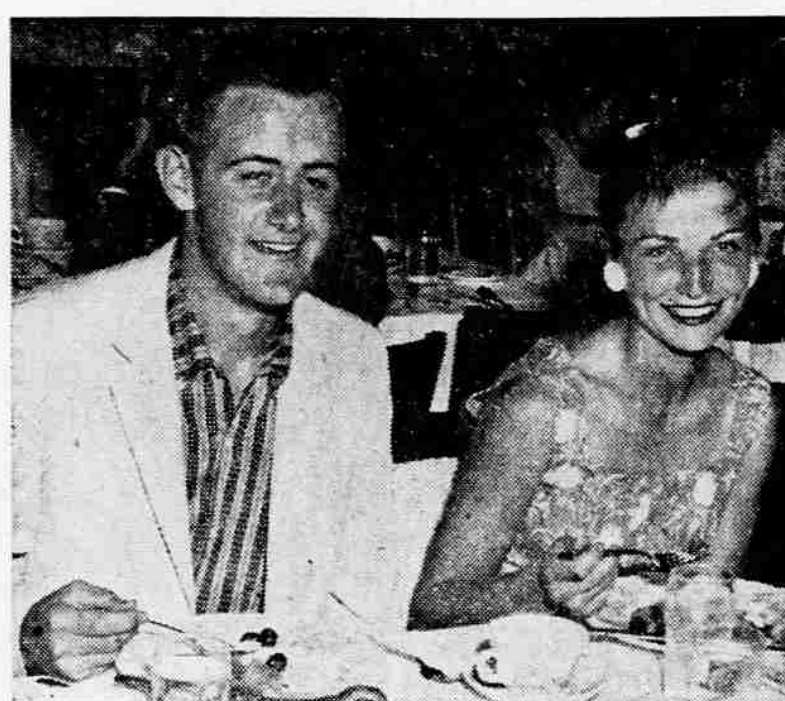
Episcopalians Plan Dinner For Thursday
