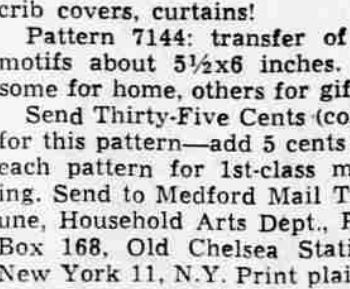

Stringer, who is also bird chairman, read an article on the various birds that are most beneficial and appreciated by the garden lover in cleaning plant life of insects, worms, etc. Birds such as the killdeer, the chickadee and the wren need only water and a little food to encourage them to accept the hospitality of the inviting houses placed in safe areas for them, she said.

Mrs. Lotz, horticulturist, read an article on "Trees that Grow Anywhere." The Chinese elm particularly emphasized.

Summer Fruit Compotes

A thin sugar syrup poured over fresh summer fruits can add zest to fruit appetizers and dessert compotes. Place equal parts of sugar and water over flame for about five minutes. Add lemon, lime, mint, ginger or almond extract to the syrup and pour it over the clean fruit. The flavoring may be varied each time, but try lime syrup over lemon balls, ginger syrup over sliced fresh plums and almond syrup over peaches.

Outdoor Supper Begins Unit Year

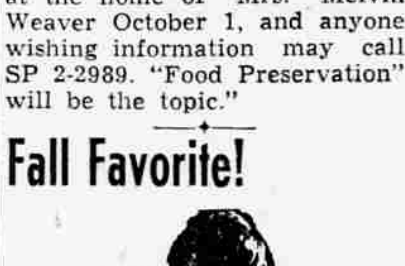

Many Women in Public Office Survey Shows; Trend For More

New York—(U)—Government increasingly is women's work.

There are more women in public office than ever before, and the trend is toward still more, reported the Republican National committee.

"Our women's division is not trying to set women apart," said Miss Bertha Adkins of the committee. "But women are comparative newcomers in the public service and a chart of their progress is needed."

Here are some highlights of her report, which she said was nonpartisan.
In 1923, when official employment records first were issued, there were 80,000 women in federal government. Now, there are nearly 576,000.

First Woman

The first woman elected to Congress was Miss Jeanette Rankin (R.Mont.), who took office in 1916. Since then, 62 women have been elected or appointed to Congress.

At present, there are 16 women, 9 Democrats and 7 Republicans in Congress.

Women serving in the 1937 state and territorial legislatures total 321, an all-time high. New Hampshire, with 53 women lawmakers, leads the states.

Nearly 50 per cent of all postmaster jobs are held by women.

At least 10,000 women hold municipal office, and another 18,000 are in county jobs. The posts range from city police chief to county commissioner.

There are 114 women justices in federal, state, county and municipal courts, exclusive of justices of the peace.

The number of women in foreign service is at an all-time high. They include Miss Frances Wallis, ambassador to Norway.
