Council Holds Meeting

Gold Hill—At the last regular meeting of the Gold Hill city council, Mayor Ernie Cooper, in cooperation with the state fire marshal's program issued a proclamation that the week of Oct. 6 through 12 be designated as "fire prevention week."

In compliance with a request from the director of the county civil defense, the council favored the transfer of \$132 to active city funds for the purchase of two atomic fallout measurement instruments.

The council decided not to give permission to a request to pasture goats within the city, since the goats might soon have to be declared a nuisance and the owner would then be faced with the problem of disposing of the animals.

The city recorder was directed to advertise that the city is interested in purchasing a used crawler type tractor with hydraulic angle tilt blade, not less than 40 drawbar horsepower, direct diesel starting, and unit constructed. Sealed bids will be received until 5 p.m. Sept. 26.

Due to many complaints received by the council concerning unsanitary conditions which exist within the city, the council decided to notify the owner, suggesting that unsanitary conditions be corrected within 10 days.

Supt. Floyd Taylor reported that in addition to routine duties, other work accomplished during August included completion of the painting of fire hydrants; doors at the fire hall were painted; city hall windows cleaned; two large trees were removed from city streets; and work was done on the new Seventh st. opening.

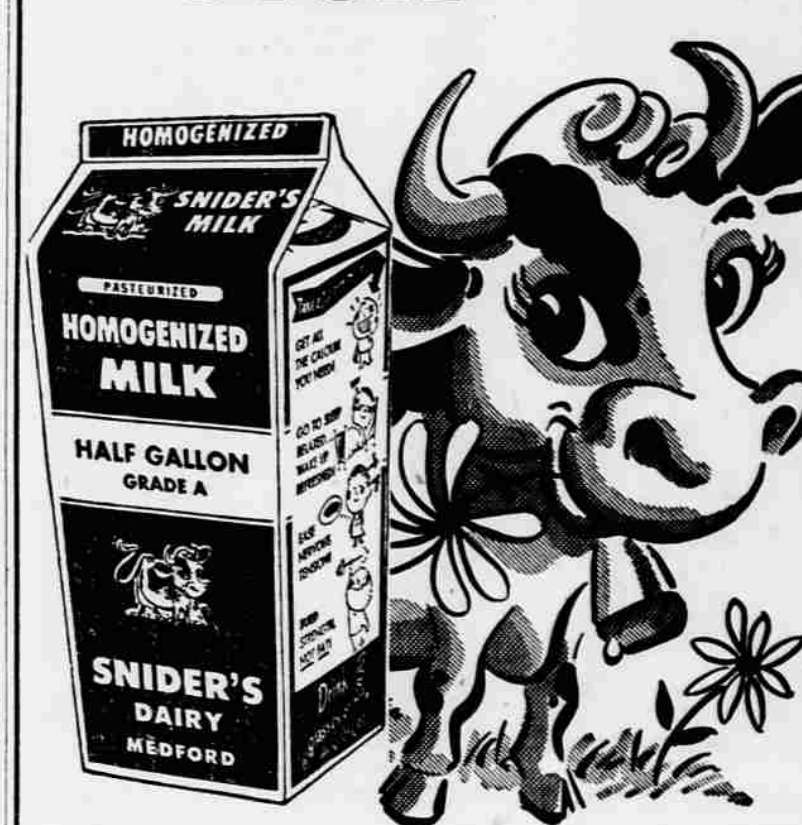

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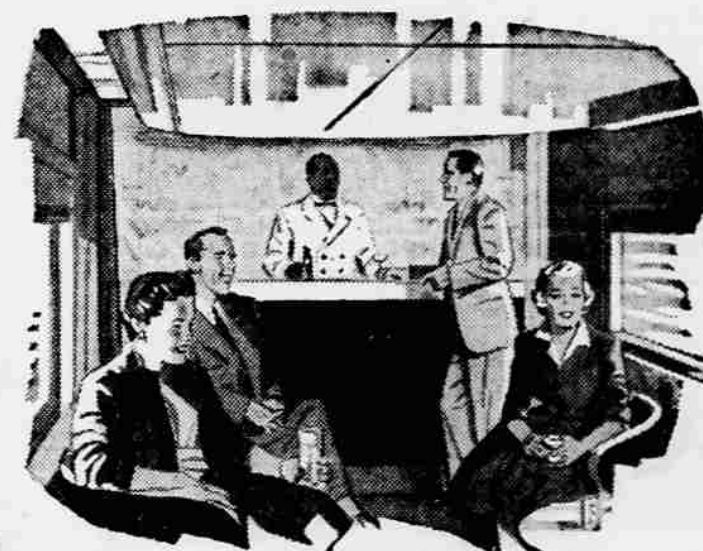
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
