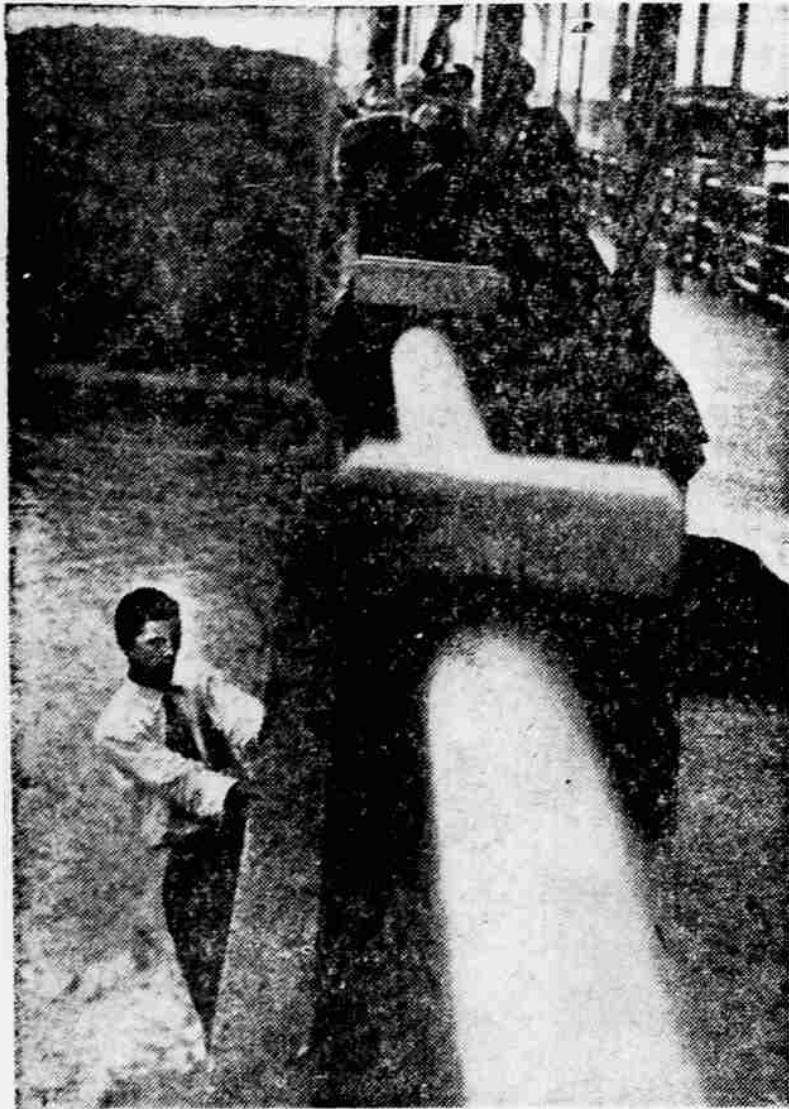

Nashville, Tenn.—Police Chief Douglas Hosse, following the dynamiting of integrated Hattie Cotton school early Tuesday:

"We've taken about all that we can be expected to take. Those who do not intend to obey the law can either get out of town or be subject to immediate arrest."

New York—James Critchlow, top Radio Liberation analyst in Munich, Germany, on the Soviet jamming of the United Nations debate on Hungary broadcast:

"It indicates the Kremlin's fear that the Soviet population may learn the truth regarding the brutal suppression of the Hungarian freedom revolt."

New York — Former President Truman, commenting on the state of the nation:

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## Bulls Do Very Well For Many Years in Wall Street Market

New York —(U)—For a long time there were those kind souls who felt sorry for the bears in Wall Street who were being squeezed by steadily rising prices.

Then came a turn and some who saw the bears gloating over their good fortune began to feel sorry for the bulls.

Market men point out that the bulls have done very well for 10 these many years. For a long time they had a one-way market in their favor.

If one takes April 28, 1942, as the start of this bull market the average then was 92.92. That same Dow-Jones average had touched a record high Sept. 3, 1929, at 381.17 and a low July 8, 1932, at 41.22. It had rallied to 194.40 March 10, 1937.

Some say this bull market started June 13, 1949 when the industrial average was at 161.60. No matter where one puts the beginning the rise has been a big one — to above 520 April 6, 1956, August 2, 1956, and again July 12 of this year.

The experts say the bull market still is here. There are orthodox ways for a bull market to die and this one hasn't conformed with the rules. Hence it still lives.

Harris, Upham & Co. says the bulls have done well during the past eight years and should not object to this pause. That could put our economy on a sounder basis.

While this is going on, the firm adds, a trading policy is likely to produce most profitable results.

Harris, Upham, like several other firms, looks for a 520-420 trading range.

"Too much inflation," says the firm, "is a dangerous thing, and it is apparent that strong measures are being taken to

check the rise in the cost of living.

"This may well have to be done at the expense of profits. It may mean some increase in unemployment."

## State Police Attend Session in City Hall

Reviewing latest methods, on-the-job training and a refresher course were on schedule for several Oregon state police officers yesterday in a session at the Medford city council chambers.

Supervising the class was H. G. Maison, head of state police. Maison said the class was an all-day affair which will be held once each month in every district of the state to inform officers of new ideas and review other work.

Most of the Tuesday session was on fish and game rule enforcement.

## COMMUNISM A THREAT

Washington —(U)—Chairman Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.), of the House Committee on Un-American Activities said Tuesday Communism remains a serious internal threat to the United States. Walters made the statement after Daily Worker editor John Gates reported that party membership dropped 45 per cent last year.



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
