# Metals Spark Stocks In Three-Day Rally

New York — Stocks scored their third consecutive gain today, a feat not accomplished since mid-July. The three-day rally, sparked by metal shares, has restored around \$4 billion to market values.

Individual gains in the main list ran to more than two points, although a number of issues eased from their highs for the day.
