REGISTRATION OF OREGON FRYER PRODUCERS

Notice is hereby given that producers of fryers and broilers in Oregon must register with the State Department of Agriculture by October 7, 1957, to qualify to vote in the producer referendum to be held from October 28 to November 7, 1957, inclusive on the creation of an Oregon Fryer Commission.

Registration forms are being mailed to producers whose production has been reported by processors and handlers to the department at Salem. Any fryer or broiler producer who does not receive a registration form by September 16 may obtain one from the office of his county extension agent or from Paul T. Athens, Ala. — Energetic thieves made off with almost an entire sawmill near here.

Sheriff Clyde Ennis said two men had stolen about 1,700 pounds of sawmill machinery from Sherman Marsh and had come back for a second load when Marsh spied them.

'Chain' Phone Calls Thwart Check Passers

Springfield, Ohio — A "chain" telephone-calling system is being used here to thwart bad check passers.

Chamber of Commerce officials said merchants try to detain any person suspected of attempting to cash a phony check.

But if the suspect leaves before police arrive, the merchant calls the chamber whose employees then contact 10 other local businessmen.

Each is asked to call five other merchants who in turn telephone five others and so on.

The system is put into operation as soon as a fraudulent check is discovered, even though it may be several days later.
