BLM Board Makes Inspection Tour

Advisory board members of the Medford forest district, bureau of Land Management, will inspect the progress of construction at Howard Prairie Dam and Dead Indian tunnel during a field trip Thursday.

The 15 man board and invited guests will also review plans for recreational zoning and development of the federal lands adjacent to Howard Prairie reservoir and Hyatt Lake. A permanent sample plot which has been installed as part of the half completed district forest inventory project will also be inspected.

The National Park service has prepared a map showing recommendations for zoning of the areas adjacent to Howard Prairie reservoir for public use sites, organizations sites, summer home sites and areas reserved for future recreational use.

A road location has also been recommended by the park service.

Advisory board members will be accompanied by C. H. Armstrong, superintendent division of state parks; Philip Lowry, state senator; Al Littrell and Robert Duncan, state representatives; Carroll Brown, supervisor of Rogue River National forest; Neal Butterfield of the National Park service and Gordon Whitaker and James Callan of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Stevenson Named To National Panel

Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, president of Southern Oregon college, will serve on the advisory panel for the Academic Year Institutes, Sept. 18 and 19, in Washington, D. C., according to Urner Liddel, director of the program. Dr. Stevenson explained that the panel would evaluate requests made by institutions of higher learning for obtaining grants from allocated federal funds. The staff of the National

Science Foundation will then review recommendations of the panel as a basis for determining grant recipients for the following year.

The institutes are sponsored by the science foundation.
