

Home Economics Program Open To All County Women

All Jackson county women are invited to participate in the home economics program being organized this fall by the Oregon State Extension service according to Miss Mary Pat Lucy, county extension agent. Miss Lucy points out that the lessons, taken through the county's extension units, are free and open to all local women. Organization of women into extension units is already underway for the first series to begin in October.

How to freeze fruits, vegetables, and prepared foods will be the featured lesson during October. Economical use of the freezer, and general tips on freezer storage will also be included in the lesson.

In November the women will study the use of "Consumer Credit," including types of credit, interest rates, charge accounts, loans and buying plans.

December and Christmas are synonymous. Usually at Christmastime, family budgets are somewhat tight, so food buying tips for the consumer will be featured. It will be especially related to the holiday season, says Miss Lucy.

New and easier sewing methods will be presented in a workshop on basic sewing, fitting, and pattern selection.

Delicate pastry and good pies are often the mark of a good cook, says Miss Lucy. In February, ways and means to make different types of pastries and pies will be offered.

Because meat is usually the most costly part of a meal, it is important that it is cooked correctly. The March lesson will include cookery of the choice cuts of meat, and meat for thrifty meals.

"Skin Care and How to Coordinate Your Wardrobe" will be taught during April and May. With these two lessons women

will have the opportunity to not only beautify their complexions, but to coordinate a wardrobe that flatters.

All lessons will be taught by Miss Lucy. Miss Lucy will be assisted in the preparation of this material by specialists from Oregon State college. Any interested woman is asked to contact Miss Lucy, at the Jackson County Extension office (telephone SP 2-5264) for further information.

Nickel Corporation Roundtable Subject

Commercial mining of nickel in the Cave Junction area should begin in 1959 or 1960, Bruce J. Manley, a member of the board of directors of Nickel Corporation of America, told the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce roundtable luncheon yesterday.

Manley said Nickel corporation, which is developing the area, will use a chemical method of extracting ore from the dirt.

At present, there is only one such plant in the United States, that one at New Orleans, La.

The nickel extracting plant now in operation at Riddle is not suitable to the type of nickel ore found in the Cave Junction area, he said.

Manley said if ore shipment to New Orleans proved to be costly, a chemical extracting plant would have to be built in southern Oregon. Construction costs of such a plant were listed between 25 and 30 million dollars. Manley said if a Medford area extracting plant had to be built, additional capital would have to be obtained by the corporation.

Increasing amounts of nickel being used in steel manufacture will insure a good and rising market, for the Cave Junction ore, he added.

Madras Hotel Guttled By Fire on Monday

Madras — Fire of undetermined origin gutted the 21-room Jefferson hotel on U. S. Highway 97 in downtown Madras early Monday, with no injuries reported.

Some occupants of the 41-year-old structure fled in nightclothes and others lost personal belongings in the flames.

A coffee shop, beauty shop and Trailways bus depot located in the hotel building were also destroyed.

Independent Phone Week Is Observed

Columbia Utilities company of Medford recently observed Independent Telephone Week which honored the contribution of the independent telephone communications system in developing the smaller areas of the United States and its possessions.

D. O. Hood, president of Columbia Utilities, which serves Shady Cove, Prospect, Eagle Point, Butte Falls, White City and the surrounding areas, is a director of both the Oregon and United States Independent Telephone associates. He noted that there are 63 independent telephone companies in Oregon operating 181 exchanges.

Columbia Utilities company has increased in plant property value from \$400,392.38 in 1947 to \$1,472,674.40 in 1947. In 1957 the figure included an investment of \$2446,247.05 in a telephone plant of the California-Oregon Telephone company, an operating subsidiary serving Newell and Tulelake, Calif., area.

A question period will follow. The public is invited to attend. Brazil's independence day is observed Sept. 7.

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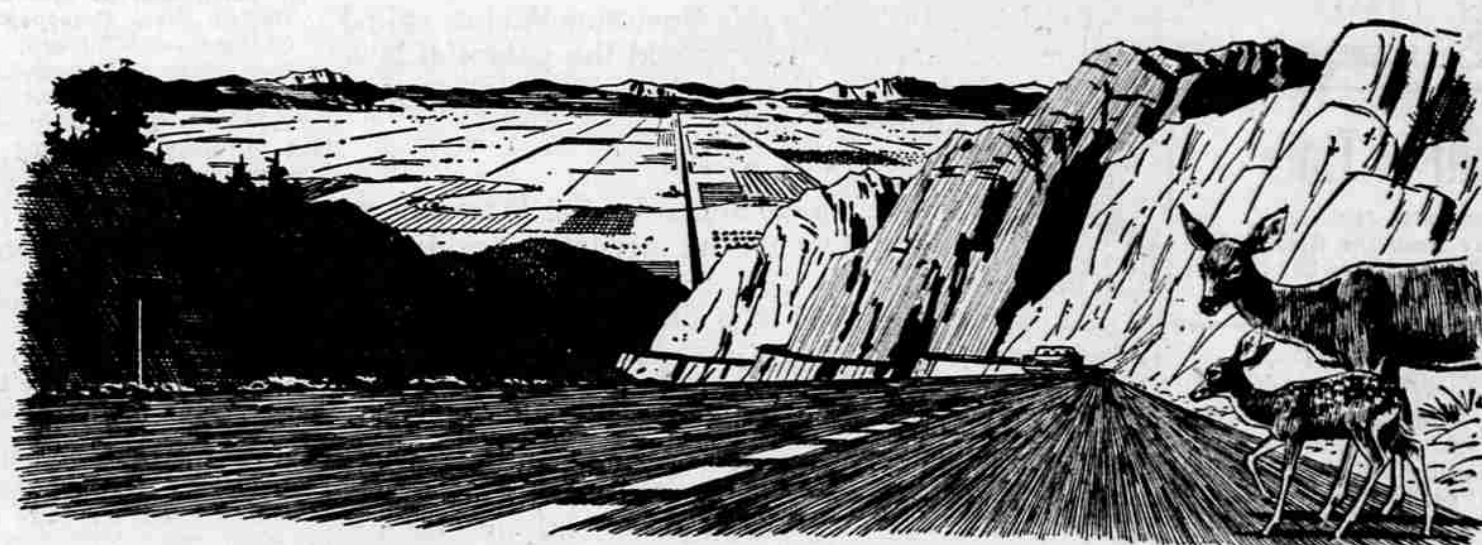
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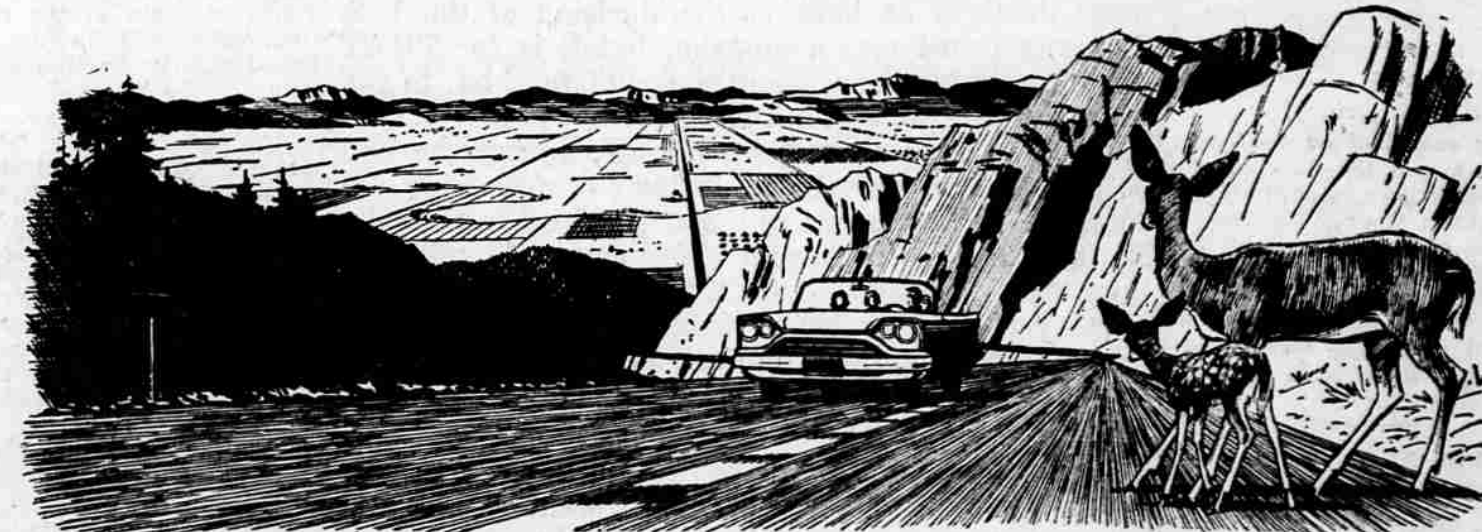
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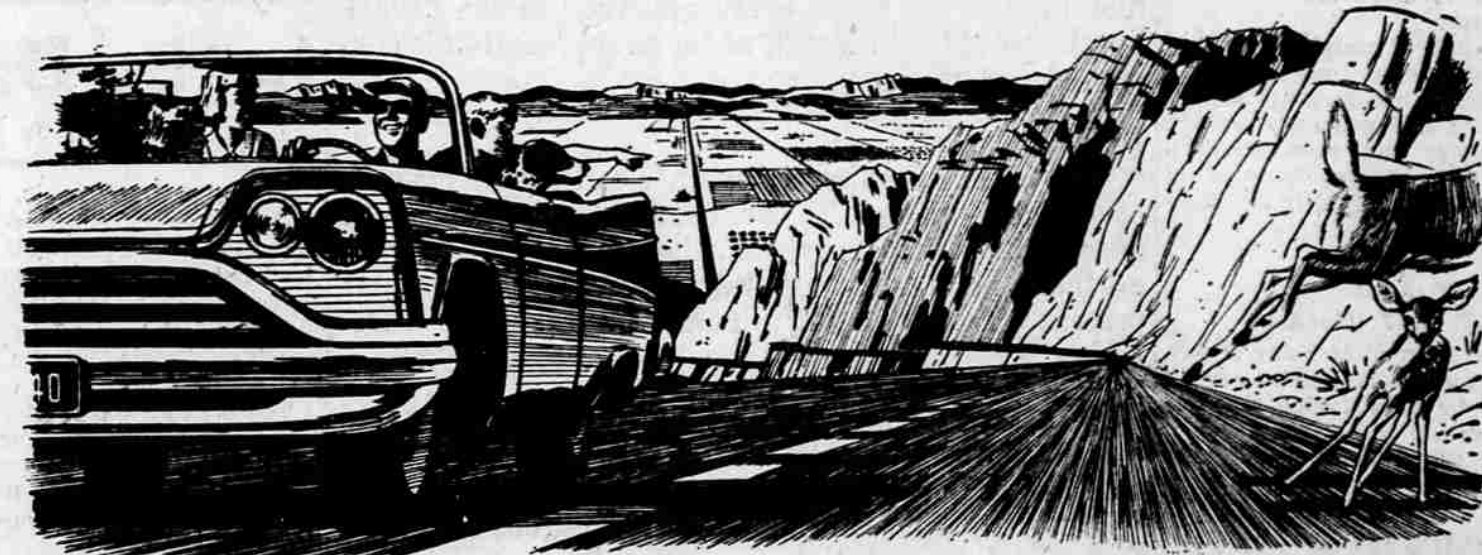
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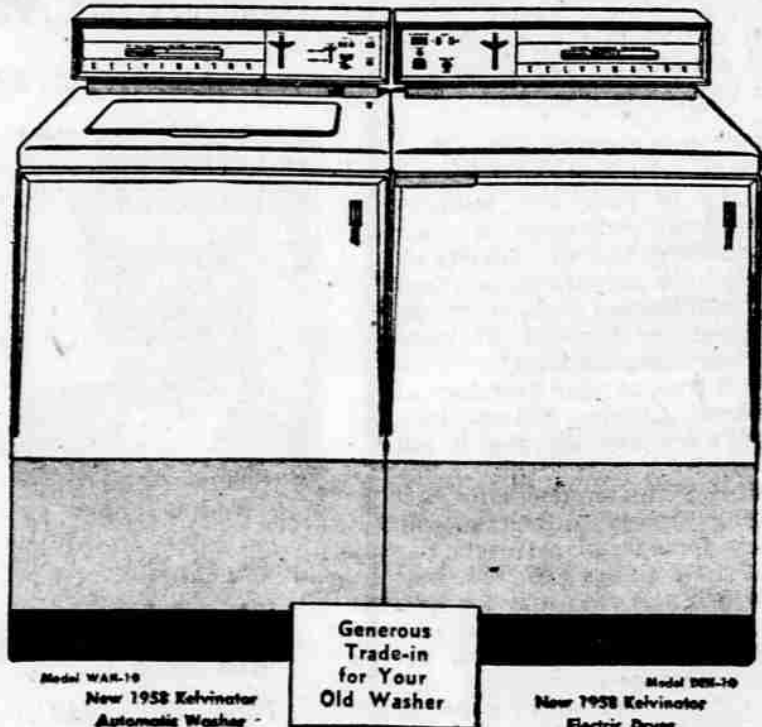
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
