Brave Youngster Gets Reward for Series of Mishaps

Quincy, Calif. — "Hard Luck" Rodney Gott, a frail 10-year-old whose nickname can only hint at his misfortunes, has been rewarded for his long and brave battle against a rapid-fire series of serious ills, including polio.

The boy, able to laugh with his benefactors even from the sickbed, has been named honorary sheriff of this Plumas County town. And he's now also honorary fire chief of the Quincy volunteer fire department.

Sheriff W. C. Abernathy and Fire Chief R. G. Anderson told young Rod of his new honors as he lay stricken with rheumatic fever, the latest illness to attack his body. They said the sheriff's certificate and red helmet were bestowed because of the boy's bravery and the way he rallied from each new malady.

The first link in the tragic chain occurred in January, 1952. At that time, his mother said, Rodney fell from a chair and fractured a leg. Seven months later, he slipped and broke it again.

In November of the same year, Rodney was hit by polio.

Two Bad Falls
He was taken to Children's Hospital in San Francisco for treatment. While in the hospital, the lad's condition was complicated by chicken pox. When Rodney left, five months later, he had only 10 per cent use of his right leg.

"Things were uneventful until 1956," added Mrs. Gott, "and then they started to happen again."

Last September, while playing, the youngster fell out of a tree house. After he recovered, he hurt himself badly by falling again.

And just last month Rodney complained to his mother of feeling tired and of pain in his joints. The doctor said it was rheumatic fever and prescribed a long rest for the boy, perhaps for months.

Anderson and Abernathy, hearing of the boy's affliction, met him and were particularly impressed with his courage and patience. They decided to give him two awards that most kids his age dream about.

After the bedroom ceremonies were over, Rodney's only comment was:

"Oh, boy thanks."

The Communists, who claim to have lost 60,000 members because of a split over whether to sever ties with the Kremlin, said they are reducing the size of the newspaper and will have to cut back further unless they raise \$100,000 soon through new subscriptions.

Foundation Gives Funds To Education

Chicago — The International Harvester Foundation is contributing more than \$250,000 this year to colleges, universities and other educational agencies.

John L. McCaffrey, board chairman, said the contributions are part of the foundation's over-all aid-to-education program.

Of the total, he said, \$100,000 is earmarked for distribution to 31 state associations of independent, privately endowed U.S. colleges.

McCaffrey said this year's donations are the largest the foundation has made.
