Is That So?

The mark of the woodsman is economy—and if he is smart he can pick up a lot of good tips from women. In comparison, most men are pretty extravagant. Here are some of the tips I've picked up.

You've heard and so have I. "Never put bananas in the refrigerator." But a mother of a large family showed me how the kept part of an eaten banana



fresh by peeling it, placing it in a tightly-covered can, and storing it in the refrigerator. She gave it to her infant next day. Said that she saved money by buying bargain-priced overripe bananas, peeling them, keeping them this way until they were needed.

Save your stale buns, raisin breads, etc. They make delicious bread pudding.

As for stale doughnuts—split them, dip them in French toast batter (one egg to a quarter cup of milk), and brown them quickly in butter. Served with bacon, jelly or syrup they are delicious for breakfast.

To take hard-boiled eggs to a picnic, put them in an egg carton to prevent them from smashing.

Wash out and save your ice-cream and cottage-cheese cartons for picnics. You can use them for bowls, and dispose of them when you're finished.

Before you leave for an outing, coat the outside and bottoms of cooking utensils such as frying pans with laundry soap. This will enable you to wash off the soap easily.

Wash Eggs First
Boil eggs and potatoes for potato salad together. Wash the eggs first, then remove them when the potatoes are cooked through. Shells will remove easier this way, too.

When you serve milk in a small pitcher, grease the outer lip of the pitcher with butter to prevent the milk from dripping to the tablecloth when you pour.

Jackets and sweaters last longer if leather reinforcements are sewn on elbows. It's much easier if you stitch around the edges of the leather with an unthreaded sewing-machine needle first. Then you can do the hand-sewing quickly using the ready-made holes.

Don't discard dull sewing needles. Simply sharpen them on the sanded side of a match box. Turn the needle around as you sharpen it to keep it even on all sides.

When the tips of your shoe laces come off and cause untold trouble in lacing shoes, you can replace them effectively by winding tape around the ends of the lace. Or dip the ends in glue, twist them into a point and let them dry overnight.

Will Soften Leather
If your shoe pinches, don't throw it away. Wring out a cloth in very hot water and place it over the spot while the shoe is still on. The heat and moisture will soften the leather and make it flexible enough to expand and remove the pinch.

To remove rust from a knife blade, plunge the blade into an onion and leave it stand there for an hour or so. Before you remove the blade, work the blade back and forth through the onion a few times. Then wash and polish it as usual. It may save you the price of a new knife.

Want to cut down on your long-distance telephone bills comfortably? Then place an egg timer or glass near your phone, in full view. It operates on a three-minute schedule and will warn you exactly when your three minutes are up. Easier than watching a clock, too.

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'Do-It-Yourselfers' Advised To Obtain Services of Expert

Chicago.—Efficiency expert E. A. Cyrol contends that most do-it-yourself projects are a "waste of time and money."

Cyrol, a time-motion expert who is retained by several big manufacturing companies, has a new motto:

"Don't do it yourself."

In Cyrol's considered opinion, a man should spend his time "doing what he can do best."

"If you're a writer, for instance, hire a carpenter to build the basement shelves and spend your spare time writing freelance," Cyrol advised.

Improve Earning Power
Do-it-yourself projects might be all right as a hobby, Cyrol conceded, but the time might better be spent in "improving your earning power."

"Night school, for instance, could pay bigger dividends," he said.

Cyrol cited the case of a man who worked for a large firm and came up with a good idea on materials handling. But the company policy would not permit employees to pursue such ideas on company time.

So Cyrol told the fellow to

work out his plan at home, write it up and present it.

"I told him he'd probably get a bonus, a raise, or maybe even a good promotion," Cyrol said. "But he couldn't spare the time. He was fixing his attic or something."

Don't Save So Much
Actually, Cyrol said, if you figure your costs accurately you don't save as much as you think on do-it-yourself activities.

"And if you figure in your time," he said, "you may be losing money. After all, your time should be worth something."

Furthermore, he said, on most household projects you'll get a

better job from a professional.

For example, there was the authentic case of a man who writes a widely read do-it-yourself column. The fellow took his own advice and tried to fix the pump on his washing machine.

He did, but the pump squirted water into the motor.
A new motor cost him \$36.

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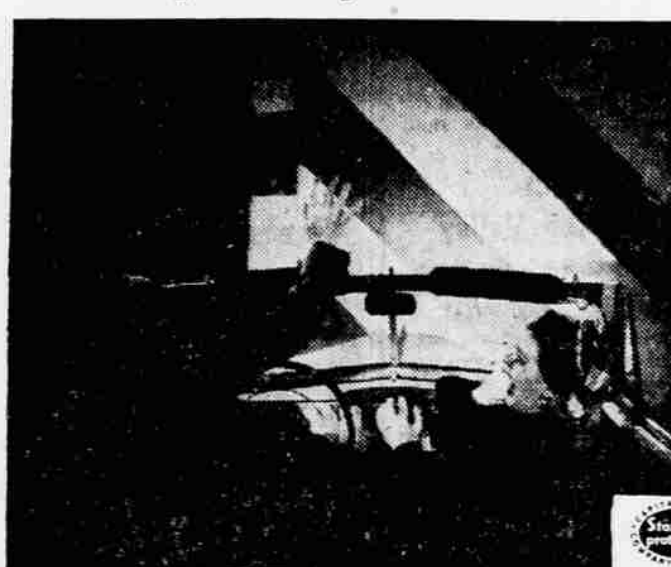
