Envelopes for Mercy Flights Applications Available in County

Beginning today, it will be possible to obtain Mercy Flights, Inc., subscription application envelopes in 11 Jackson county communities, according to officers of the non-profit air ambulance service.

The self-addressed envelopes can be used for mailing in subscriptions, or renewals which entitle the holder to free emergency medical transportation in the firm's ambulance planes within 400 miles radius. It also

permits reduced fees for non-emergency medical transportation. The fee is \$4 per family unit per year, or \$2 for individuals.

The income from the subscriptions, in turn, permits the ambulance planes to continue in service without depending on uncertain income from flight fees.

Police to Enforce Crossing Stop Law

The chief said the recent accident at the Stewart st. crossing is a good example of cars failing to come to a complete stop when electric signals at a crossing are in operation.

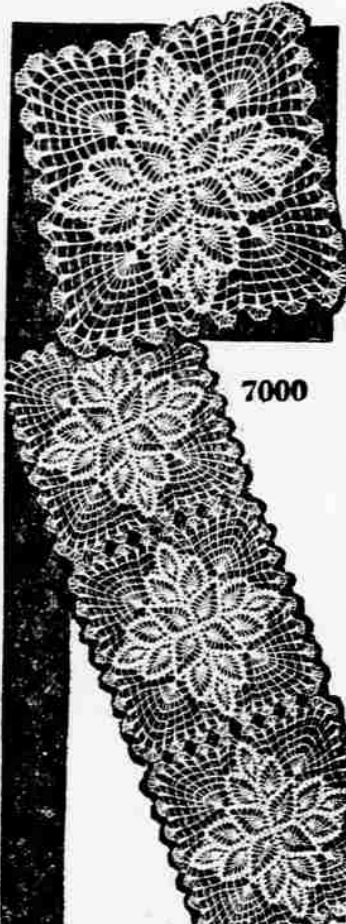
Hawkinson's Opens Grants Pass Office

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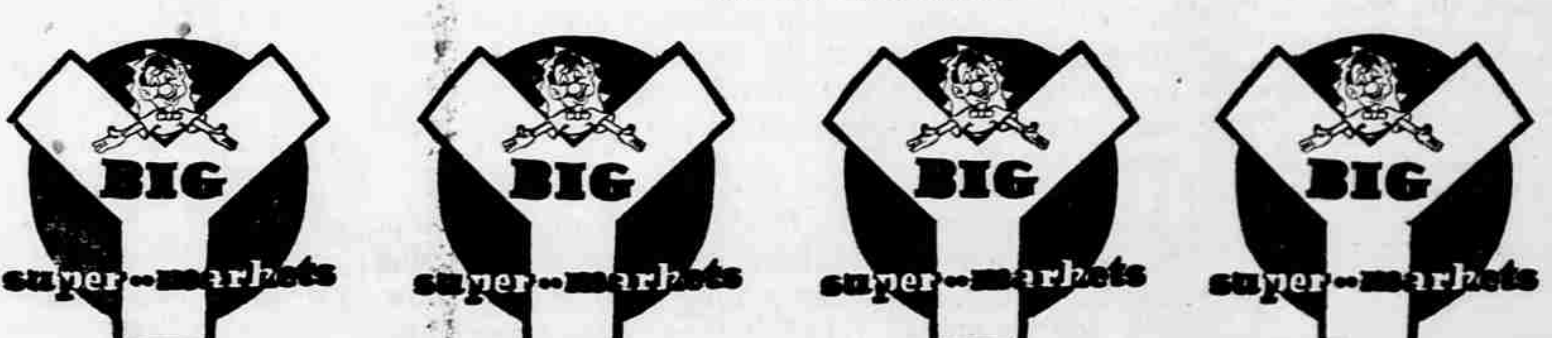
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
