

Meeting on Safety Fair Plans Stated For Monday Night

Firms and organizations interested in participating in a "Safety Fair" in Medford in mid-November have been urged to attend a special planning meeting at 7 p.m. in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel.

William M. Bell, state industrial accident commission, chairman of the program committee, said details concerning contests and types of displays and demonstrations will be announced at the no-host dinner meeting. Additional committee assignments will be made and a general discussion of the event is planned.

The general discussion will be led by Myron Terpening, safety director of Bate Lumber company, Grants Pass, general chairman of the Southern Oregon Regional Safety committee.

Accident Commission

The safety fair will be under the auspices of the state industrial accident commission. O. H. Smeltz is district supervisor of the commission. The industrial accident commission is making an attempt to enlist the support of every segment of the community in order to plan a show which will be interesting and informative to the public, Smeltz said.

Groups and firms which already have indicated interest and support include Elk Lumber company, Medford corporation, Medford Safety Council, Josephine County Safety Council, police departments in Grants Pass and Medford, Ideal Cement company, California Oregon Power company, Bureau of reclamation, Bate Lumber company, Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association, and other individuals and organizations.

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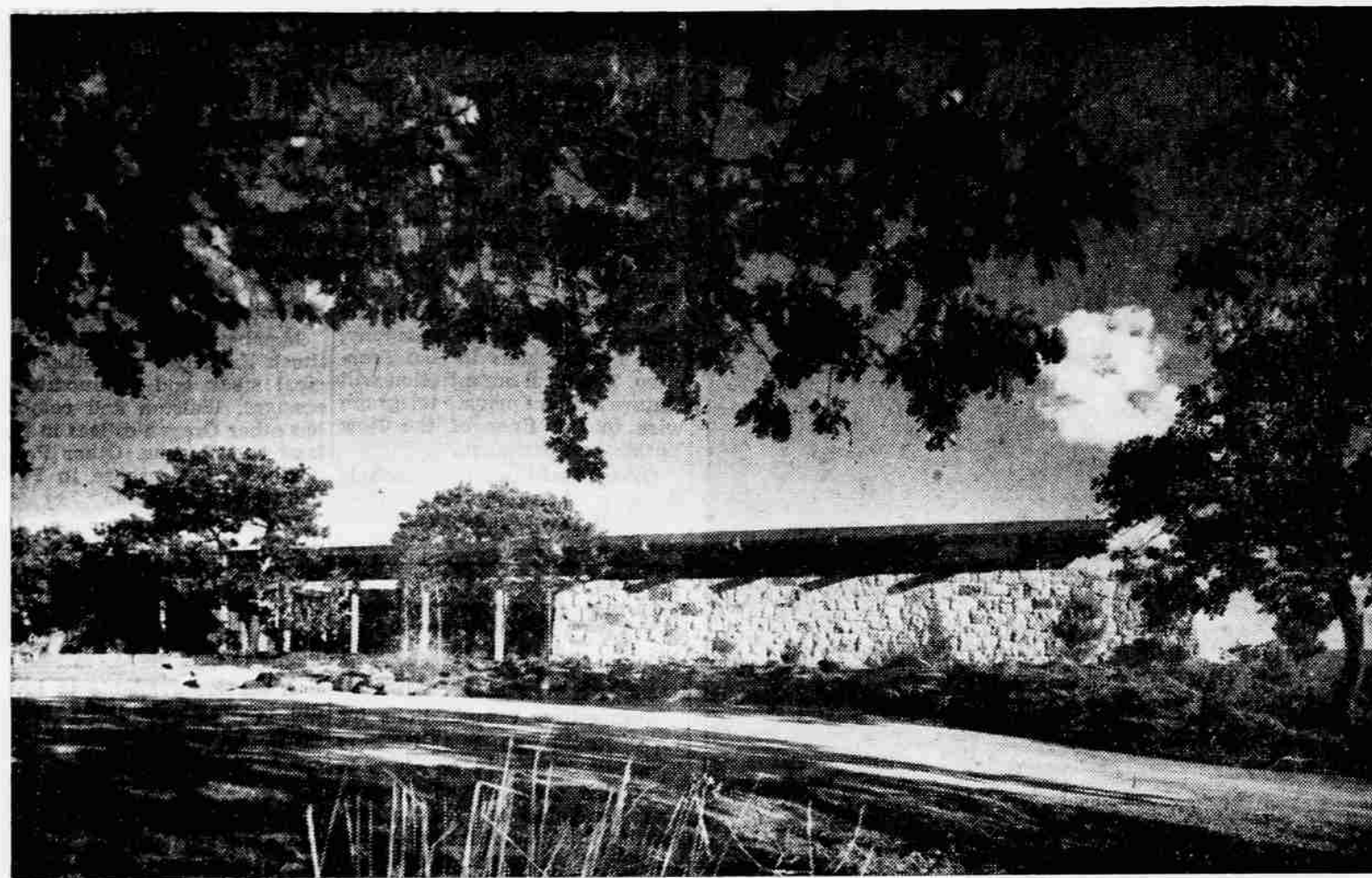
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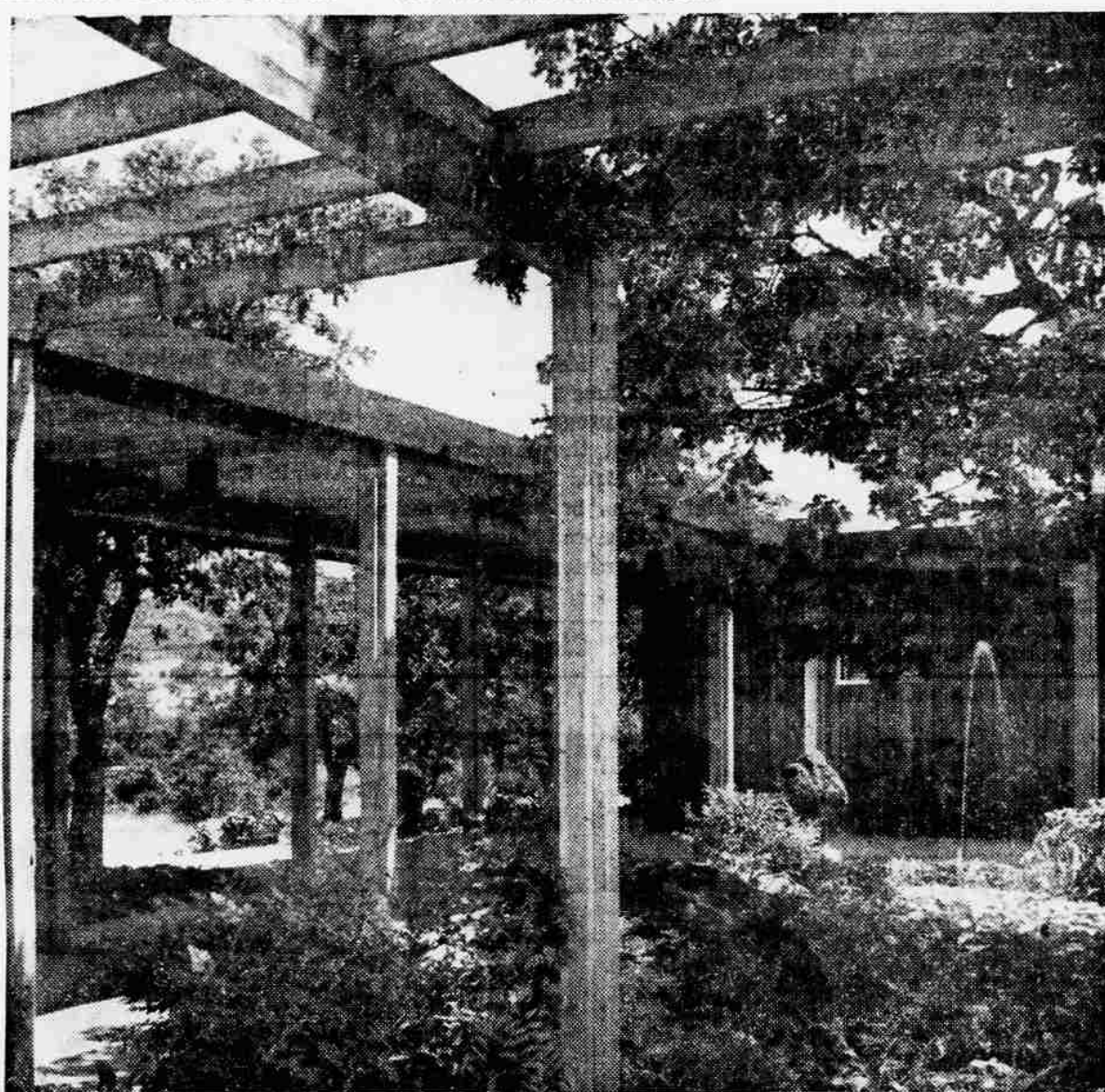

closes a garden court. A long porch-patio runs the full length of the house along the south side with paved terrace beyond and a view of the orchards. The living, dining, kitchen and family rooms which form the connecting part of the U look out to the south or into the inner court. The landscape architect was Lawrence Halprin.

Styled on contemporary lines, the home has "living areas" rather than rooms. The family numbers five persons, Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter and their three children, Karen, Scott and Emily.

Portland Firm Plans Warehouse Expansion

Portland—One of the largest foreign car parts warehouses in the Pacific northwest will open in Portland by Riviera Motors, Inc., which will supply \$300,000 worth of Volkswagen parts to serve Oregon, Utah and Montana.

The firm's Oregon addition has been planned as another step in the Volkswagen nationwide plan to make the car's service and parts supply comparable to any automobile on the road, officials of the firm said.

Oregon cities with dealers serviced by the new firm include Bend, Coos Bay, Corvallis, Eugene, Klamath Falls, Pendleton, Portland Roseburg Salem, and Morse Motors in Medford.

Carpenter Home Wins Western Award

Menlo Park — The Medford home of Mr. and Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter, designed by San Francisco architect, George T. Rockrise took a merit award in the 1957 Western Home Awards program, the awards committee announced today.

The home was one of 28 award winners in the recent design competition co-sponsored by the American Institute of Architects and Sunset Magazine. Entrants included architects from the 11 Western states and Hawaii. The purpose of the program was "to focus widespread public attention on outstanding Western residential architecture."

The Medford winner is located in Veritas Orchards, Foot Hills road. Built on a flat-topped hill, the U-shaped house encloses a garden court. The bedrooms form one wing; family and activity rooms form the connecting part; carport, storage and work rooms form the other wing. The living, dining, kitchen and family rooms look out over the orchards to the south and into the inner court. A long porch-patio runs the full length of the house on the south with paved terrace beyond, offering varied outdoor dining and lounging areas.

Many Entered

Two-hundred eighty-five of the top homes in the West were entered in the program, one of the largest group of homes ever assembled in a design competition. Homes built in the past 3 years and designed by a registered architect were eligible. Entries included both custom-built and subdivision-designed homes.

Six Northwest architects won top awards. Three of the top 7 honor awards went to Paul Hayden Kirk of Seattle; one to Paul Thiry of Seattle. Awards of merit went to Ralph Anderson of Seattle; Bassetti and Morse of Seattle; two to Robert Bills-brough Price of Tacoma and Terry and Moore of Seattle.

The winning Pacific Northwest architects will receive their awards at the Northwest A.I.A. district meeting in Gearhart, Ore., October 18.

The 28 award winning homes will be featured in the October

Sunset, and in special exhibits of photographs and plans that will go on display in several cities. Included will be Meier & Frank, Portland, October 14 through October 18; Macy's, San Francisco, September 23 through September 30.

Members of the seven-man jury selecting the award winners were:

Carl Koch, architect, (jury chairman), lecturer at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology; designer of the "Tech-Built" house.

Thomas Church, pioneer of contemporary garden design, author of "Gardens for People."

Harwell Hamilton Harris, architect, designer of outstanding West Coast homes, formerly Director of the School of Architecture at the University of Texas.

Proctor Mellquist, editor, writer on architectural and planning subjects, editor of Sunset Magazine.

Charles Eames, designer, former head of experimental design at Cranbrook Academy of Art; designer of the famous Eames modern furniture.

Gardner Dailey, architect, pioneer of contemporary architecture in California, designer of Honolulu's Surfrider hotel.

George Pardee, developer of architect-designed, mass-built houses; president of the Home Builders Institute, Los Angeles.
