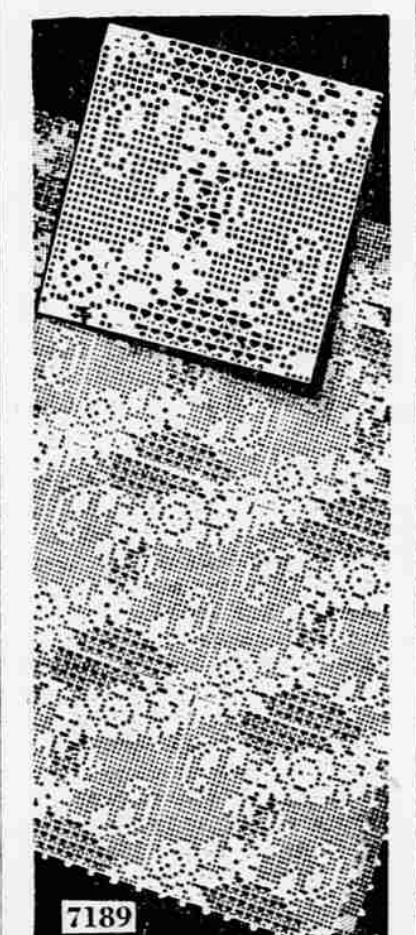

Sanderson, Medford, took third with 579. Mrs. William Kennedy, Salem, and Roy Pruitt, Medford, were fourth with 560½ points; Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Harris, Roseburg, were in fifth place with a score of 520 and the Paul Hattons, Medford, came in sixth with 515 points.

Garden tips were given in answer to roll call. It was suggested that plastic yardage be used to cover vegetables to protect them from frost. It was said that rose buds which are just showing color may be preserved by cutting with a sharp knife, leaving the stem as long as possible, dipping the end in wax and wrapping each bud in tissue paper and storing in a cool, dry place. When buds are needed they are to be unwrapped, and placed in tepid water after cutting off the wax end. Dahlia bulbs should be washed after digging and stored in sawdust, it was stated.
