Asian Flu Epidemic Reported in Utah; Other States Suffer

Health officials in Utah today battled an epidemic of Asian flu, and other serious flu outbreaks caused the death of a soldier in Arizona and hit students in Texas, Iowa and Michigan.

Dr. Joseph P. Kesler, acting director of the Utah State Health Department in Salt Lake City, termed the outbreak an epidemic. It was the first time any state has officially declared an epidemic of Asian flu.

Absentee Rates High
Kesler said late Monday the disease has swept the state with absentee rates in schools as high as 50 per cent. Officials said they planned to close some schools if the epidemic continued.

An outbreak of flu at Fort Huachuca, Ariz., was blamed for the death of Pvt. Kenneth N. Rockstroth, Danville, Ill. Doctors said Rockstroth died Sunday of complications of influenza "probably the Asian type." Some 740 persons at the army base have been afflicted by the disease.

The soldier's death was the 16th fatality in the nation believed caused by Asian flu. Earlier, the National Health Service reported 15 deaths as a result of the disease and at least 100,000 persons afflicted by the malady.

Arizona School Closes
Other outbreaks struck 1,500 students at Texas A&M College, forced a Clifton, Ariz., high school to shut down, hit about 50 students at the University of

Iowa, and struck pupils in four Michigan cities.

The high school at Clifton, Ariz., was closed Monday when 145 students were absent with flu. A number of flu cases also were reported among elementary school children in Clifton and Morenci, Ariz., but there were no immediate plans to close the schools.

The cases in Texas, Arizona and Iowa have not been clinically identified as Asian flu but are believed to be in that category.

OYSTERS NOTE

Newcastle, Me. —(P)—The Indians who inhabited Maine long before the white man came must have had a strong hankering for oysters. Experts say that ancient heaps of oyster shells lining the banks of the Damariscotta river contained an estimated five million cubic feet of shells at one time before erosion and tourists got busy.

NEWS KILLS SURGEON

Clermont, Fla. —(P)—A 78-year-old retired dental surgeon from Oneida, N. Y. dropped dead Monday night when told that his wife had died. Dr. Roy Blanchard, who moved to Clermont nine years ago, collapsed after being notified that his 69-year-old wife Hazel had died 15 minutes earlier in a hospital.

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
