

Blackmail Charged In State Meeting

Los Angeles.—A state assembly subcommittee investigating intercollegiate athletics today launched into the second session of a three-day hearing in the wake of charges that a Pacific Coast Conference school used "blackmail" to keep other conference schools from voting to allow ineligible seniors at UCLA to play. UCLA Coach Henry (Red) Sanders charged Monday in the opening day of the hearing that he was told at the conference meeting last year in Spokane that there was no

chance of getting a measure passed allowing his seniors to play football.

"We went to the meeting hopeful of being allowed to play our seniors at least in half the games as was the case in 1956," Sanders said. "But another coach told me before the sessions that his school would have to vote against the seniors or have support of the round-robin schedule withdrawn. I regard that as plain blackmail."

Sanders didn't identify the coach or the school assertedly applying the pressure.

Nine seniors of the 1957 UCLA team were declared ineligible by the PCC for accepting illegal financial aid. The conference originally had taken a year's eligibility away from all UCLA players for three years but last season allowed seniors to play in five games.

Assemblyman Frank Bonelli (D-Huntington Park) asked Sanders if UCLA could continue in intercollegiate athletics with PCC membership. Sanders replied:

"I don't see how the conference itself can continue as things are now. We have existed the past couple of years in a climate of jealousy, intrigue and venom. The PCC must abolish its archaic code or abandon football."

The subcommittee will conclude the hearing Wednesday. Bonelli, chairman of the group called the hearing to obtain information on whether formation of a California intercollegiate athletic commission would benefit California schools.

Beaver Head Leaves Club

Portland, Ore. — William Posedel resigned Monday as manager of the Portland Beavers.

Posedel made known his resignation in a telegram sent from his South San Francisco home to Arch Kingsley, president of the Pacific Coast league club.

He told Portland fans, "Sorry I could not do better." Portland finished in the PCL cellar this year.

Posedel took over managing duties for the Beavers on April 13, about 12 days after Manager William J. Sweeney died in San Diego. He had resigned as head coach for the St. Louis Cardinals to come to Portland.

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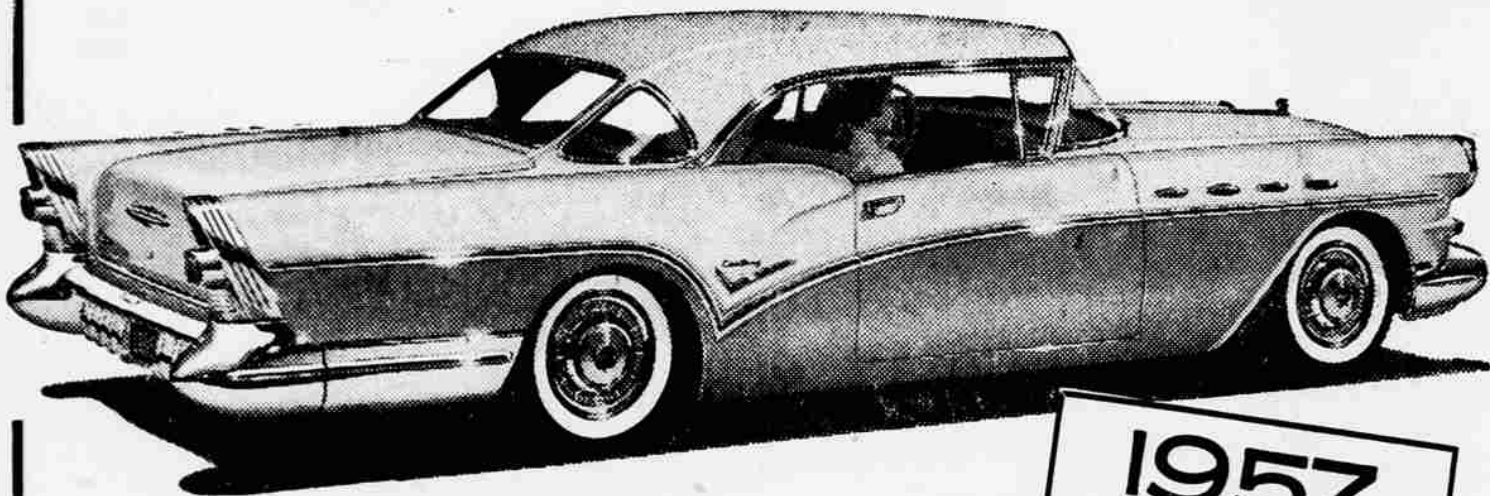
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
