His six-year contract of Colgate still had three years to run when he jumped into the hotbed of Southwestern football because "I felt the challenge was too much to pass up."

He's the United Press Coach of the week, Harold W. (Hal) Lahar of Houston, who made his debut at his new job Saturday with a 7-0 upset of powerful Miami of Florida for the biggest surprise of the first football week end of the season.

Corvallis, Ore.—Scouts have warned the Oregon State Beavers that they can expect nothing but trouble when they tangle with the Kansas Jayhawks Saturday at Lawrence, Kan.

Oregon State Tops Rushing

Los Angeles — Oregon State leads Pacific Coast conference statistics in two departments after the first week end of football action, the PCC reported today.

The Beavers are ahead in rushing offense with 326 yards and tops in punt returns with a 15.6 average, all gained in the 20-0 win over Southern California last week.

Nub Beamer, the Oregon State fullback, leads in individual rushing with 131 yards to 103 for Lou Valli of Stanford and 92 for Jim Shanley of Oregon.

Jack Fanning of Washington State caught seven passes for 93 yards and three touchdowns against Nebraska to lead that department.

Durelle Eyes Title Shot

Detroit — Yvon Durelle will try to set up a lightweight championship bout with Archie Moore by an impressive victory tonight over German heavyweight Willi Besmanoff.

Durelle will be giving up age, weight and size to the German in their nationally-televized 10-round bout at Olympic Stadium.

The ancient champion's choice for a quick title fight — after Archie had demolished Tony Anthony in Los Angeles last Friday — was Durelle, the Canadian and British Empire 175-pound king.

Durelle already is the darling of Detroit fight fans as the result of his brawl here in June with Anthony, in which Durelle got a draw but nearly knocked Anthony out in the 10th.

So if the Moncton, New Brunswick, better could stir local fans in victory over Besmanoff, Detroit might get in on the bidding for a title fight along with Toronto and Montreal.

Injury Fatal To Prep Gridder

Hoboken, N. J.—A 16-year-old Fort Lee, N. J., high school football player died Tuesday in St. Mary's hospital here, two weeks after suffering a ruptured spleen during an intra-squad practice session.

The youth, Walter Leuthke, was on the ground when a teammate tripped over him during a scrimmage, coach Joe Oxley said.

A volley ball game is scheduled for the same afternoon between the girls of the two schools.

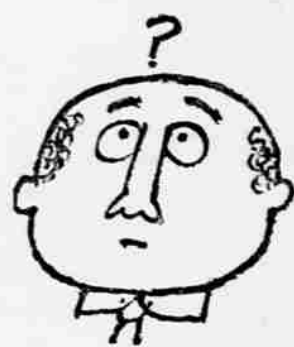
Both the football and volley ball games were tied, when Hanby played Sams Valley last Friday.

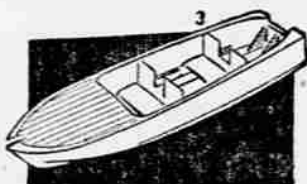

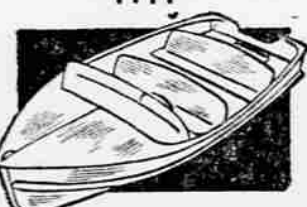
