Little Rock, Ark.—Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, commander of troops enforcing integration at Central High school, in reporting "minor incidents" with mobs Wednesday:

"There will be none (incidents) when I get through."

Washington—Assistant Defense Director W. G. McNeil, on the expected cost of perfecting the nation's first ballistic missiles:

"... It is estimated that the cost of developing ballistic missiles to an operational state will be a good deal more than double the cost of developing the first atomic bomb."

United Nations, N.Y.—Australian External Affairs Minister R. G. Casey, in warning that Russia may be stalling on disarmament so as to launch a surprise attack on the West:

"Russia may have it in mind to attack and attempt to overwhelm the West by sudden and colossal violence before existing weapons of retaliation can be brought into action, and so seek to implement their (sic) stated aim of communizing the world."

Washington—Atomic Energy Chief Lewis L. Strauss, in proposing that a clearing house be set up to publish non-secret atomic research reports in language the public can understand:

"It may well be that the government should review its procedures to make what it has available, and that which belongs to all the people, more readily available."

Hollywood—Superior Judge Herbert V. Walker, on the apparently deadlocked jury in the Confidential magazine criminal libel trial.

"We'll just leave them alone for a while and see what happens."

Holmes Asks FCC To Hold Decision On Building Dams

Salem — Gov. Robert D. Holmes today asked the Federal Power Commission to uphold until Jan. 31, a decision on the Northwest Power company's application to build Pleasant Valley and Mountain Sheep dams on the middle Snake river.

That would give the State Water Resources Board time to investigate merit of the project, the governor said.

Motion From Thornton
Action was taken in a motion from Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton which included the 50 pages of exception to the FPC examiners' recommendation of last July approving construction licenses of the dams.

"There is evidence that these projects are prejudicial to the state of Oregon," the governor said, adding he was "opposed because of their single purpose nature and limited storage capacities."

Thornton said the water resources board, which was given authority over license applications by the 1955 Legislature, should complete its study of Snake river dam site by the end of January.

Railroad Man to Retire After 45 Years Service

Portland—E. F. (Si) Ghormley, formerly of Medford, will retire after 45 years of service with Southern Pacific railroad company on Sept. 30 under the railroad's retirement plan.

Ghormley was stationed in Medford in 1914 to 1915 and later in 1917. While in Medford in 1915 he married the former Dana Downing.

He has worked as an agent, telegrapher, ticket clerk and other positions in 20 Oregon cities during his 45 years with Southern Pacific. He will retire as the assistant passenger traffic and public relations manager in Portland.

Second Firing Of Atlas Fails

Cape Canaveral, Fla. — There were two strikes today on the Air Force's huge Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile.

The second firing of the Atlas failed at 15,000 feet Wednesday. Scientists were examining the shredded pieces of the Atlas which was exploded after drifting to one side and tilting back toward the ground. The test was another attempt to match Russia's claimed firing of an ICBM.

There was no official word from anywhere, but indications were that both civilian and military authorities were not altogether displeased with the result of Wednesday's operation.

Officials indicated that "a great deal of information was gained from the firing and that other attempts would definitely be made to fire an Atlas." It was also learned that the cause of Wednesday's failure was not the same as that which caused an Atlas to be destroyed shortly after launching June 11 here.

Police Speak at Jaycee Meeting

Police Capt. Clyde Fichtner and Patrolman Oscar Renfro discussed the driver improvement training program in Medford at a meeting of the Medford Junior Chamber of Commerce this week at the Rogue Valley Country club.

Captain Fichtner pointed out that most collisions could be avoided by using good defensive driving, and that there are few actual accidents. He said most mishaps classified as accidents are actually the result of poor driving habits.

Patrolman Renfro showed a motion picture on the result of poor driving habits. The Medford Jaycees are sponsors of the annual Teenage Road-E-O program for driving instruction.

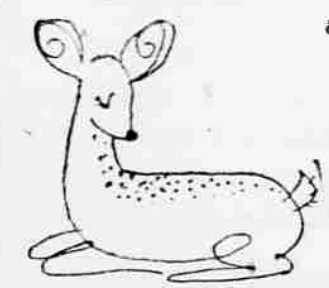
