Famous French Designer Takes "Backward Look"

New York—Christian Dior came out today with a new look—the backward look. The French designer put away scissors, temporarily, and picked up pen to write his autobiography "Christian Dior and I" E. P. Dutton company.

He traced the growth of his dressmaking establishment in Paris from 1947, when his "new look" set off an international style revolution, to the present with his name a household word, his label on everything from furs to shoes and perfumes. The book also gives plenty of insight into Dior, the man—a shy, often superstitious, and amazingly modest person—equipped with a good sense of humor.

Dior said that as designer he had been dubbed "madman, criminal, megalomaniac, genius, grand vizier, emperor . . ." But "my real hobby," he said, "is architecture. It has fascinated me ever since I was a child. Prevented . . . from gratifying this passion, I found outlet for it in dress design."

Dior disclosed that it was a fortune teller who in 1919 predicted his future. "You will suffer poverty," she said. "But women are lucky for you . . . You will make a great deal of money out of them and you will travel widely." Fortune tellers also advised him to link up after World War II with Marcel Bousac, the French textile magnate.

An Inspiration

"As a result of wartime uniforms, women looked and dressed like Amazons," Dior explained. He said he designed for "flower-like women," clothes with "rounded shoulders, full busts, willowy waists above enormous spreading skirts . . ."

"The style that was hailed as new and original was nothing but the sincere and natural expression of a fashion I had always sought to achieve," he said. Dior's 1946-47 changes made him famous immediately, and brought him to this country to receive fashion acclaim. But in Chicago, he recalled, housewives picked him, shouting "Down with the new look . . . burn Monsieur Dior . . . Christian Dior, go home."

The "H" silhouette a few years later caused just as much a furor. It was immediately named "the flat look," the designer recalled, "but it had never been my intention to create a flatness which would bring to mind a string bean."

One irate male, a farmer in Idaho, wrote: "With your so-called genius, you have succeeded in disgracing my wife. What would you say if I sent her to you?"

Style Wears Out
Dior said the most successful fashion "wears itself out the quickest because it is overly imitated. Obviously, uniforms have the longest life."

The designer confessed he always tries for a catchy term for each collection because "one must cater to the modern taste for a slogan."

"In the spring of 1955," he said, "I picked on the fullness of the skirts of certain models and isolated the letter 'A' . . . I arrive at the name . . . by thinking in terms of the most conspicuous, eccentric silhouette . . ."

Dior makes a few observations about his clients, except to tell of one customer "disloyal" to Dior.

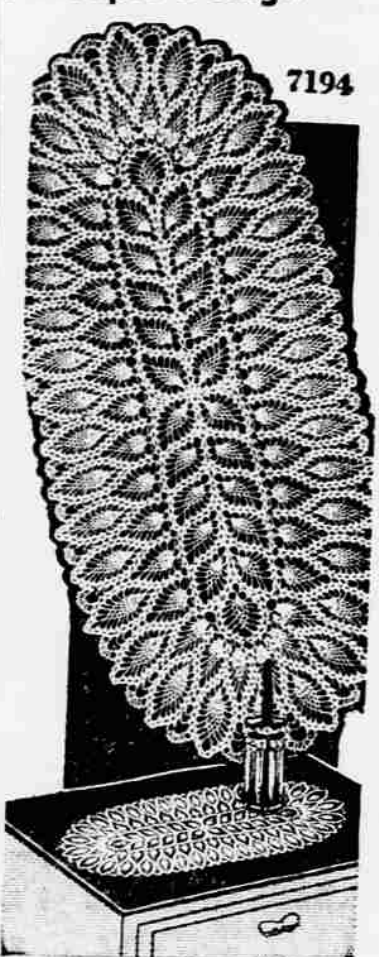

BLM Awaiting Word Of Cutbacks in Sum For Western Oregon

Washington — The Bureau of Land Management is momentarily awaiting word of expected cutbacks in the amount of money it can spend for timber management and access road development on the O&C lands of western Oregon.



A. Robert Smith, The Forest Service has already been cut back \$2.5 million from the amount Congress appropriated for its forestry programs. Biggest item in this cut was \$1,000,000 taken from its road building program.

Many other government agencies are up in the air about how much they can spend on western resource development programs because of an order from the Budget Bureau intended to hold down government spending. Purpose of the spending limitation is an effort by the Eisenhower administration to avert a fiscal crisis concerning the national debt.

tional debt. The president's fiscal advisors have warned him that it is necessary to curb spending to prevent the government from shooting up through the national debt ceiling of \$275 billion.

Wants To Avoid Increase
Only Congress can authorize an increase in the debt ceiling, and the lawmakers won't be in session again until January. The administration wants to avoid having to ask for an increase in the debt limit. In recent weeks, the debt has been precariously close to the ceiling. It now stands at about \$272.5 billion, but it shifts up and down daily with Treasury balance sheets on government securities, taxes and expenditures.

How big the cutbacks may be is still guesswork. Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton said he doesn't expect the new spending allowances will impede any programs, but he still doesn't know how much his department can spend.

Above Last Year
For its program of recreation area improvements called "Operation Outdoors" the Forest Service had planned to spend \$11.5 million this year. But Congress, in the Capitol Hill economy wave, trimmed this to \$8.7 million. This was still well above last year when they got only \$3 million. The Budget Bureau has now trimmed their appropriation to \$8 million, for a \$700,000 cutback.

Northwestern members of Congress are critical of the fact that in the trimming operation now underway, funds for timber access roads are being reduced. Sens. Wayne Morse and Richard L. Neuberger, in a joint letter, have jumped on this by arguing that this will in turn reduce government receipts from timber sales and not result in government economy.

Neither outbreak has been definitely shown to be the Asian strain of the disease.

Doctors at Iowa City said preliminary tests on the virus there indicated it was not Asian flu. They said the football players all had been inoculated for the disease.

Meanwhile, in Tallahassee, Fla., health officers said flu was sweeping the campuses of two state universities and reported more than 5,000 "mild cases."

They said there were no present plans to close public facilities since such action had not been shown to be of help in flu epidemics.

Smear tests are under way to determine the exact variety of the outbreak.

Toledo Situation 'Explosive'
In Ohio, state Health Director Dr. Ralph E. Dwork termed a

flu siege in the Toledo area as "explosive and epidemic." About 50 per cent of the pupils in three Toledo area schools were reported suffering from a respiratory illness believed to be Asian flu.

The disease has reached epidemic proportions so far in two states, Arizona and Utah, and at least 16 deaths have been blamed directly or indirectly on the flu.

Mississippi, one of the hardest hit states, has reported an estimated 99,840 cases of Asian

flu alone.

However, a possible new weapon to stem the spread of the disease, which invaded the United States about three months ago after sweeping the Orient, was announced today in New York.

An iodine preparation known as betadine was reported to have the power to kill the Asian flu virus within 15 seconds upon contact in the throat and respiratory system. It can be used as a throat spray or wash when symptoms first appear.

Flu may be the toughest opponent some of the nation's collegiate football teams face all season.

At least 15 University of Iowa gridgers were sidelined today in one of the latest outbreaks of the disease. They were among about 200 Iowa students reported stricken in the past three days.

Coach Forest Evashevski said third string end Jerry Jenkins was the only player confined to the infirmary but the others, including All-American tackle candidate Alex Karras, were out of action.

He said there had been no discussion of canceling the opening game of the 1957 season Saturday against Utah State.

Arizona State Coach Max Spillsbury, at Flagstaff, said about a dozen of his players were out with the flu.

He said the situation was "serious but not critical" and the school was going ahead with plans to play Redlands University of California Saturday.

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Home Sites at New Lake Will Be Available in '59

Home sites at Howard Prairie reservoir will not be available until late 1959 at the earliest, according to bureau of land management officials.

They said applicants need not worry about "being left out in the cold about homesites." If there are more applicants than homesites a public drawing will be held.

The BLM has not worked out details of the sites yet. Before drawings can be held, complete details and a survey must be made. Applications will not be received until details are worked out, officials in the Medford office said.

Summer Home Sites

The summer home sites are tentatively scheduled to be built on the south and east sides of the reservoir. The BLM has set aside two areas of the west side, one on the east and one island as public use areas
