

Red Raiders En Route To British Columbia

 Ashland—Coach Al Akins is still grumbling to himself about the Southern Oregon college Red Raiders' poor performance, last Saturday when they defeated the Moffett Naval Air Base gridders 26 to 6.
 This week the Raiders have been concentrating on correcting their mistakes as they readied for travel to Vancouver, B. C., to take on the University of British Columbia "Thunderbirds" Saturday.

Although displeased with the Raiders' play last week end, Coach Akins could not suppress a look of satisfaction when the names of fullback Ron Maurer, quarterback Lance Locke, halfback Delmar Brood, and tackle Chuck Romine were mentioned.
 Maurer scored three times on runs of 75, 52, and 18 yards and will again be expected to lead the SOC attack on the Thunderbirds. Locke, completing 9 of 18 passes against the Moffett ground crew, proved that he can inflict a damaging aerial barrage to diversify the Raiders' ground attack. A sophomore transfer from Shasta JC, Delmar Brood proved a pleasant surprise for Coach Akins as he grabbed four Moffett punts for returns of 16, 54, 46, and 82 yards, only to have two of the dashes called back by SOC penalties.

Chuck Romine, all-conference guard last season, is a strong contender for a repeat selection this year. He made key blocks and showed sharp defensive play which was outstanding in a game marked by generally poor line play.

The Red and Black clad warriors from Southern Oregon boarded a chartered bus early Friday morning, to travel to Bellingham, Wash., where they will spend Friday night. The SOC team will travel to Vancouver Saturday morning, and will meet the Thunderbirds from the University of British Columbia at 1:30 p.m. in the 6,300 seat UBC stadium.

The Thunderbirds, who lost seven and won two under Coach Frank T. Gnutp, last season are of an unknown quality to this year's Red Raider coaching staff, as this is the first meeting be-

tween the two schools. As members of the Evergreen conference the University of British Columbia lost to Pacific Lutheran, Eastern Washington, Western Washington, Whitworth College, College of Puget Sound, and defeated Central Washington College to end up seventh in the conference last season.

Coach Akins expects to meet a much improved squad in this year's edition of the Thunderbirds, and the Red Raiders will have to turn in much improved performance when they take to the turf this Saturday to earn a victory over the UBC team.
