The lead-off activity of the Boys League intramural program will be a table tennis tournament which is scheduled to get under way this week. Some 52 boys will be needed to round out the program. Judging will be based on sportsmanship, as well as playing skill, and a tie clasp-link set will be awarded to the champion.

The state convention of the Future Teachers of America will be held in Medford Oct. 18 and 19. The purpose of the convention will be to elect state officers. While the future teachers are in southern Oregon they will make a tour of Southern Oregon college, and the Medford club will sponsor a banquet.
